HIGHWAY ENGINEER IS NAMED BY BOARD

Bowly, of Portland, Chosen by Commission Out of Nearly Three-Score of Applicants.

The new state highway commission, created by the last legislature, consisting of Governor West, State Treasurer Kay and Secretary of State Olcott today announced the appointment of H. L. Bowly, of Portland, as state highway engineer. The appointment is worth \$3000 a year, the same amount Bowly is drawing as executive officer of the Pacific highway association, of Portland.

Bowly was formerly state highway engineer of Washington and has had much experience in road-building. The board believes that he is a good man for the place. He was not among the 50 applicants who wrote to the board urging their selection.

Bowly will take office June 3, when the law creating the commission goes into effect.

WOODMEN OF WORLD HAVE CONVENTION

Five Carloads of "Choppers" Welcomed by Local Lodge—Parade to Hall Led by Band.

With 700 visiting members of the Woodmen of the World arriving at 10 o'clock this morning, the convention by that order for today was opened with a rush and enthusiasm very creditable to the lodge. The meeting is being held in the armory, and that spacious building was packed this forenoon when Judge Shelber of Polk county, called the convention to order.

The delegates arrived by way of the Southern Pacific. Five carloads of choppers were brought down to the intersection of Trade and High streets from the main line, where the local lodge and the Salem Military band waited to welcome them. The members of the order were then formed in a line and marched through the streets, and then went to the armory. The parade, consisting of W. O. W. members, two deep, was two blocks long.

Mayor Steeves Welcomes. The welcoming address was delivered by Mayor Steeves. The mayor delivered a fine talk and assured every member in attendance that Salem is proud of the honor of being their host, and wished them a pleasant time while in the city.

A. Donaldson, of Salem, was elected temporary chairman of the convention, and the order will get down to business in earnest this afternoon.

There are six counties in this district, Yamhill, Marion, Washington, Multnomah, Polk and Linn, and every one is well represented here today. There will be 76 candidates initiated this evening, and the Salem and Silverton teams will perform the work.

The big delegation, together with the local members of the W. O. W., will take part in the carnival parade this evening.

CITY NEWS.

N. Burns called at the police station last night and asked for a place to remain the night. He was accommodated but this morning when the officers called him they discovered he was insane. He told the officers that a band of girls was after him and had set tonight at 7 o'clock as the time to kill him. He will be taken before Judge Bushey this afternoon for examination.

The supreme court has under consideration today a Portland case in which H. J. Bellart seeks to have a prohibition clause, applying to a precinct in Portland, placed on the ballot at the coming election in June. It is contended by the defense that the clause cannot be voted upon until the regular election in November.

Frank Ward, one of Salem's leading druggists and business men, was appointed a member of the state board of pharmacy this morning by Governor West. The appointment is for a term of five years. Mr. Ward is a finished druggist and is a fit man for the important position to which he was appointed. At present he is connected with the J. C. Perry Drug Co., and is also an official of the Elks club. Mr. Ward has been in the drug business in Salem for many years and has formed a wide acquaintance not only here but in other Oregon cities. He will assume the duties of his new office immediately, but his connection with the Perry drug firm and the Elks club will not be severed.

Was Up Some High.

Paris, May 21.—The world's altitude record for an aviator with a passenger was broken at Bue today by Aviator Perron. He was aloft for two hours and 25 minutes, ascending 13,278 feet.

The Capital National bank has distributed to 664 children seed popcorn, to be used in the competition in connection with the Salem school fair in September. The children are to plant 1000 square feet of ground with the corn, and the one who raises the most will get first prize of \$25, the second \$10, third \$5 and the next 10 \$2 each. There was not seed enough to supply the demand, and so many were disappointed. The contest is a big booster for the school fair.

Attorney-General Crawford today gave an opinion to State Bank Examiner Wright that, under the new law, banks which carry in their title the word "trust" must eliminate the same, unless they comply with the law and transact a trust business. To comply with the law would mean that \$50,000 must be deposited with the state, and other formalities complied with. The law goes into effect June 3, and the banks have 12 months thereafter to make the necessary changes.

Although the postoffice department has used extraordinary efforts to locate owners of the lost stolen from the mails by Messenger Martin, while carrying sacks and packages from the depot to the postoffice, about 25 per cent remains untraced in the local office. Much of the goods stolen by Martin was intended for Christmas presents, and the parties mailing it may have in many instances failed to learn that it had not been delivered. About 95 per cent of those who called for goods lost located it here.

One of the most important railroad hearings of the year is in progress in the office of the railroad commission today. Representatives of all the steam and electric roads are here to explain the situation as to grade crossings, sidetracks and other matters. Much testimony is being taken.

Miss Iva Stanley, of Dallas, arrived here this morning, and will be the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Goode.

State Superintendent Alderman returned today from Wallowa county, where he spent a week visiting the schools and making commencement addresses. He spoke at the City of Wallowa, Enterprise, Joseph and Lostine. Wallowa county has as many high schools as the entire state of Oregon had 12 years ago, the superintendent stated today, and school and general conditions are flourishing. Crops are good and the region has justly been named the Switzerland of America, according to Mr. Alderman.

der the influence of liquor was soon discovered by Superintendent Hale and he was placed under the care of the doctor.

Who Is Responsible?
It is highly improbable that the Wineberger had could have gotten so helplessly intoxicated while riding in the same seat of an auto with the sheriff and the other man, believe the authorities, unless the liquor was given to him by either the sheriff or the doctor in the party. Superintendent Hale stated today that the sheriff had no authority to turn the boy over to the sheriff of this county and that he did so for the reason he was ashamed to bring the charge to the school in an intoxicated condition.

It is not known as yet just who the physician accompanying Sheriff Kelsey is, but he is a Portland man. It is also not known where the two men went to after turning the boy over to Sheriff Each, but it is thought they returned to Portland.

In the event the sheriff of Wheeler county is responsible for the boy's condition when he was brought to Salem, it is probable that he will be prosecuted, and the other member of the party will also be made responsible in the event it is found that he gave the minor liquor.

Is Mere Boy.

Crete Wineberger is nothing more than a child, and has served in the institution before. He is thirteen years old and was brought back to the reform institution for breaking a parole granted to him some time ago. He told Superintendent Hale this morning that a man in Wheeler county was recently prosecuted for giving him whiskey. The lad's parents, according to Superintendent Hale, are unfit to care for the boy. Another son of the Wineberger family is also in the school at the present time.

The training school authorities are not satisfied with the examination made this morning and will question the lad more closely this afternoon. The boy was not physically able this morning to give a very accurate account of his experiences during the past few days owing to the ill effects left by the liquor.

It is a mystery to both Sheriff Each and to the superintendent of the reform school how Wineberger could have left the Condon jail and be confined in the Multnomah county jail without the bottle of whiskey being found. It is an iron-clad rule throughout every county that all prisoners, whether man, woman or child, shall be thoroughly searched before being placed in the jails or prisons, and this rule is respected rigidly especially by the Multnomah county sheriff and his deputies.
