## WOMEN GIVE OCCUPATIONS AS 'MOVIE' STARS

Los Angeles, Cal.—Aroused by newspaper accounts of arrests in several California cities of women who have permitted their occupations to be registered on police records as moving picture actresses, managers and leading players with companies operating studios on the west coast have made formal demands that more careful inquiries be made in the future into the occupations of arrested women to offset a wave of "public sentiment which is rapidly classing moving picture actresses with all that is disgraceful and wrong, and seriously jeopardizing their reputations."

To air the movement to bring about a change from the stereotyped answers which have become general among the women arrested for violations of the law, actresses permanently identified with various producing companies have written letters to the police heads in several cities, asking their co-operation. To this end a complete list of names of actresses who have at any time been employed for picture work has been supplied to the police department in every large city in the state. Daily records of names are now kept at each western studio, and at the end of each week a completed list of the names of all women who have been employed as "extras" is forwarded to this and other cities.

"The practice of giving their occupation as moving picture actresses has become entirely too common among women under police surveillance," said Aubrey M. Kennedy, general manager of the Universal Film Manufacturing company studios at Hollywood, Cal.

Within the last month there has been a total of almost one thousand women arrested, and in nine out of ten cases where it was their first or second offense, and they were not known to the police, they gave their occupation as moving picture actresses.

"The publication of these untrue reports is bound to create a widespread public opinion against women who are regularly employed as experts in their profession. Readers of the various newspapers are of the impression that a moving picture actress is nothing more than a police charge on parole. It is both unfair and unjust to the profession.

The actresses themselves are particularly indignant. Many of them have written individual letters to city officials here and elsewhere, requesting that assistance in bringing about more critical examinations into the occupations of arrested women.

Many young girls of acknowledged ability as moving picture actresses, have felt the effects of the unjust statements in their social relations. They are looked upon with disdain and suspicion by many with whom they are not intimately acquainted. In consequence of this antagonistic attitude, a number of the younger girls have resigned their positions.

Grave action is planned by leaders in the movement to stifle the adverse sentiment against these actresses in the event the police fail to check the prevailing tendencies among women of ill repute to class themselves as moving picture performers.
