BID AT PAR COMES FOR BIG BOND ISSUE

The United States National Bank of Salem last night bid par for sewer bonds in the amount of \$380,000, which this city has been endeavoring to float for some time. The bank wishes to make a charge of \$7500 for acting as fiscal agent. The bid was referred to the committee on accounts and current expenses.

Later in the meeting Colonel E. Hoffer made an address, in which he urged that the people be allowed to take the bonds and have their assessments can-

celed. He claimed the liens bothered somewhat in making transfers. Stitz said the city was following out the procedure laid down by the voters when they authorized the issuance of the bonds.

Earlier in the meeting an opinion of City Attorney Page was read. In it Attorney Page stated that liens for sewer improvements could not be canceled until the \$380,000 bond issue was sold and the cash received by the city.

ADVERSE DECISIONS IN MORTGAGE CASE

Supreme Court Refuses to Grant an Injunction Requested by Oliver E. Hunt Against Spencer.

The supreme court handed down the following local decision today:

Oliver E. Hunt, appellant, against Spencer S. Hunt and F. W. Spencer, respondents. Motion for an injunction, from Marion county, to stay the foreclosure of a mortgage. The defendant was arrested for embezzlement without a warrant, and, while he was in the county jail, he executed and gave a note for \$1700 for his release. Later, on trial, the note was declared to be worthless by Mrs. Hunt, who had not signed it. Motion was denied. The supreme court holds that she can interpose her defense in a foreclosure proceeding.

SEEKING TO ENJOIN TWO STATE OFFICERS

Kay and Olcott Defendants in Suit to Tie up \$450,000 Appropriated for Columbia Project.

Secretary of State Olcott and State Treasurer Kay are defendants in a suit filed this morning in the Marion county circuit court by L. H. McMahan, appearing as a citizen and taxpayer of Oregon, in which the plaintiff seeks to enjoin the defendant, Olcott, from drawing warrants on the state treasury for the sum of \$450,000.

It is alleged in the complaint that, unless restrained by the court, the defendants will draw \$450,000 from the treasury of the state to provide for the construction, operation and maintenance of an irrigation project in Crook county, commonly known as the Old Columbia Southern project. It is also alleged by the plaintiff that the defendant Olcott is seeking to extend the project for the benefit of certain private citizens.

WELFARE COMMISSION NAMED BY GOVERNOR

Bertha Moores, Rev. John P. O'Hara and Amadee M. Smith were today named as members of the Industrial Welfare Commission. All are of Portland. They will investigate hygienic and moral conditions under which women work, and fix the standard of wages.

NEW JUSTICES TAKE OFFICE AT CAPITOL

The two new justices of the supreme court, Chas. L. McNary, of this city, and Judge William Ramsey, of McMinnville, who were appointed by Governor West to fill the offices created by the last legislature, took their oath of office this morning at 10 o'clock.
