### UPJOHN NAMED AS DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Well-Known Newspaper Man Gets Choice Plun at Hands of Governor West.

Donald H. Upjohn today received the appointment to the office of district attorney for the 12th judicial district, which embraces the counties of Polk, Yamhill and Tillamook.

Upjohn handled the Oregonian news bureau in Salem for several years, leaving here a few weeks ago to practice law at Dallas, and it was reported that he would be named county attorney for Polk. The filing of a referendum petition on the county attorney bill put a quietus on this plan, and now the governor has made good through the creation of the new judicial district by the last legislature.

Upjohn graduated from Willamette university last year.

### Notice of Proposed Establishment and Re-establishment or Change of Grade on Market Street and the Garden Road, Which is the Extension Thereof From the Center Line of Church Street to the East City Limits.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, proposes to establish certain official grades and to re-establish and change other official grades on Market street and the Garden Road between the center line of Church street and the east city limits. The grades which are proposed to be established, re-established and changed by the common council are described as follows, to-wit:

At the intersection of the center lines of Church and Market streets at an elevation of forty-two and eight-tenths (42.8) feet, said elevation being a confirmation of the grade established by ordinance No. 661 of the city of Salem, Oregon.

At the intersection of the center lines of Cottage and Market streets, at an elevation of forty-four and eight-tenths (44.8) feet, said elevation being a confirmation of the grade established by ordinance No. 574 of the city of Salem, Oregon.

At the intersection of the center lines of Winter and Market streets the elevation is re-established and changed to an elevation of forty-four and three-tenths (44.3) feet, said elevation being a modification and change from the grade established by ordinance No. 578 of the city of Salem, Oregon.

At the intersection of the center lines of Summer and Market streets at an elevation of forty-six (46.0) feet said elevation being a confirmation of the grade established by ordinance No. 909.

At the intersection of the center lines of Capitol and Market streets at an elevation of forty-nine and five-tenths (49.5) feet, said elevation being a confirmation of the grade established by ordinance No. 576.

At the intersection of the center lines of McCoy avenue and Market street, at an elevation of fifty-one and nine-tenths (51.9) feet.

At a point on the center line of Market street, which is three hundred (300) feet east of the center line of McCoy avenue, at an elevation of fifty-three and three-tenths (53.3) feet.

At the intersection of the center lines of 12th and Market streets at an elevation of fifty-three and three-tenths (53.3) feet.

At the intersection of the center lines of 14th and Market streets at an elevation of fifty-three and five-tenths (53.5) feet, the center line of 14th street being defined in accordance with the plat of Rosedale addition to said city.

At the intersection of the northerly projection of the center line of 13th street in Frickey's Railroad addition with the center line of Market street, at an elevation of fifty-four and five-tenths (54.5) feet.

At the intersection of the northerly projection of the center line of 14th street in Frickey's Railroad addition with the center line of Market street, at an elevation of fifty-six and seven-tenths (56.7) feet.

At the intersection of the northerly projection of the center line of 15th street in Frickey's Railroad addition with the center line of Market street, at an elevation of fifty-seven and seven-tenths (57.7) feet.

At the intersection of the northerly projection of the center line of 16th street in Englewood addition with the center line of Market street at an elevation of fifty-nine (59.0) feet.

At the intersection of the center lines of 17th and Market streets at an elevation of sixty-three and five-tenths (63.5) feet, said elevation being a confirmation of the grade established by ordinance No. 993 of said city.

At the intersection of the northerly projection of the center line of 18th street in Englewood addition with the center line of Market street, at an elevation of sixty-eight and five-tenths (68.5) feet.

At the intersection of the northerly projection of the center line of 19th street in Englewood addition, and the center line of Market street, at an elevation of seventy-three and six-tenths (73.6) feet.

At a point which is the intersection of the present easterly city limits and the center line of Market street at an elevation of seventy-three and seven-tenths (73.7) feet.

All persons owning property adjacent to said Market street, and the Garden Road, which is the extension thereof, or the part thereof described above and upon which it is proposed to establish and also re-establish and change the official grades are hereby notified to make and file their written remonstrances, if any they have, with the city recorder, against the said establishment, re-establishment and change of grades within the period of ten (10) days from the final publication of this notice, and unless the owners of more than two-thirds majority of the superficial area of the property adjacent to said Market street and the Garden Road, or the part thereof particularly affected by said proposed establishment, re-establishment and change of grade, remonstrate in the manner provided by the charter of the city of Salem, Oregon, within the period above named, the common council will proceed to establish and re-establish and change the grades of said Market street and the Garden Road, at the elevations set forth in this notice by the passage of an ordinance on or after twenty (20) days from the date of the first publication of this notice. This notice is published for ten (10) days in a daily newspaper published in the city of Salem, Oregon, the first publication being the 27th day of May, 1913.

#### It's Still the Mix.

Editor Capital Journal:

In taking exception to many of your statements regarding concrete paving, I wish to call attention to one in your issue of May 29 in which you say in effect that you insist that a year's wear on the newer concrete will show it to be on the road to rapid disintegration. Of course, this is merely an assertion and cannot be proven in fact. There is no concrete street in Salem today of which this can be honestly said, not even excepting East State and South Commercial. There is no question, however, but that your inquiry into the whole matter of street paving is very pertinent at the present time. Let the truth, whatever it may be, come out and let anyone who knows any of the facts voice his sentiments.

I ask right here why the small city of Independence, only a few miles up the river, can show better results from concrete streets than Salem can. Its streets were laid nearly three years ago on a 1-3-5 mix basis by the same contractor who laid East State street. The specifications for East State called for a much stronger mix than Independence, viz., a 1-2-4 mix. The surface of the Independence streets was finished by "brooming," i. e., the surface was swept by a steel broom leaving it rough with fine edges about 1/32 of an inch high. These ridges are still plainly visible after nearly three years of wear by iron-bound traffic (farmer wagons) proving that three years of wear by

iron-bound vehicles has made no perceptible inroad on these streets. At this rate these streets will wear longer than two hundred years.

Now, if the Independence streets, with a weaker mix, 1-3-5, wear better than Salem streets with a 1-2-4, I ask why? The same contractor, I repeat, who did the Independence paving, also did the East State street job. The people of Independence, after a three-year test, are satisfied with their concrete and want more (in fact, they are now advertising for more), but the people along East State street are not satisfied and justly so. There is a nigger in the woodpile somewhere. Where is he? Can it be that the contractor lived up to specifications in Independence and not in Salem? I understand that the people and council in Independence were alive to the situation and had two competent inspectors on the job. One of them sat in a comfortable chair next to the mixer from 7 in the morning until 6 in the evening. It was his duty to count every sack of cement and every yard of material that went into the mixer. The other inspector had his eyes open for all around good workmanship. What did the people and council in Salem do along this line when the East State street job was being done? Did Salem have two competent inspectors at the right place. If not, why not? Can it be that some of the bad concrete work in Salem is due to this oversight? Let the city council protect the people who ask for concrete paving by using such methods as will insure good work. This will bring the price of concrete paving higher than it is at the present time, but it will insure good results. To it, I say. There is no better paying for the money than good concrete. When the people get good concrete streets, as they should, they will continue to demand them, and take no other.
