## THIS PITCHER GOOD FOR EIGHTEEN YEARS

Something About History of Nichols, Who Is in Automobile Business in Kansas City.

If you want to arouse an old-time fan, whisper to him, "Kid Nichols."

It is a broad statement, but thousands will support it, that baseball never produced a finer gentleman, a greater pitcher, or a more splendid type of man than Charles A. Nichols.

Today he is owner of a flourishing automobile sales agency and a bowling alley in Kansas City.

When he was 22, slender in build, boyish in appearance, Nichols earned the moniker, "Kid," which has stuck to him like a burr, by pitching Boston into the championship in 1891.

Boston won the pennant in 1891, '92, '93, '97 and '98, and Nichols was always there, doing his share, and more. In those five years the "kid" pitched 222 games, of which he won 156, giving him the wonderful average of .702.

In the early '90's baseball was a rough and rowdy game. The Tobacuses, the McGraws, the Burketts and the Kellys were in the ascendant and Baltimore, Cleveland and Pittsburgh were especially hard teams to handle. Players surged about the umpires, questioning every other decision, but Nichols was at all times quiet and orderly until play was resumed, when he quickly retired the batter.

The best hitters were clay in the hands of Nichols when he was in his prime. No matter how rough or unruly they were, the players always respected Nichols as a man and as a pitcher.

Behind the "Kid" on the old Boston team were Tom Tucker, Herman Long, Bobby Lowe, Hugh Duffy, Tom McCarthy, "King" Kelly, Charlie Gansel, Charlie Bennett, Stivers and Staley. Some baseball team, folks!

Nichols was as great a pitcher in his day as Mathewson, Bender, Walsh, Joe Woods or any star of today. He did everything they do, equally as well, and he faced more great batters than the stars are now called upon to meet.

He does not believe the game is any faster than when he pitched for Boston. He unhesitatingly names Mordecai Brown as the game's greatest pitcher, and the minor may feel proud at the compliment, coming as it does from a man who many believe is entitled to the honor himself.

Two men are named by Nichols as the greatest players. One is Frank Chance, who is managing the Highlanders this season and the other is Herman Long, the great Boston shortstop.

Nichols' career began in Kansas City in 1887; he was with Memphis and Kansas City in 1888, and in 1889 with Omaha. He went to Boston in 1890 and remained until 1902, when he returned to Kansas City, remaining through 1903. In 1904 he was with the St. Louis Cardinals and the next year with the Cleveland Indians, where he closed his major league career.

Vancouver, B. C., June 13.—"Jimmy" Agnew, of the Portland Colts, has pitched his last game of baseball, according to Dr. Bruitt, the Tacoma home-setter. Jimmy has been suffering from a lame arm for some time past, and for the greater part of the season has been unable to raise it as high as his shoulder.

## CAPTAIN WILL NOT BE IN BIG MEET

McClure, Olympic Distance Runner, Will Be Left Behind, It Is Announced by Hayward.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore., June 13.—Trainer "Bill" Hayward will lead nine athletes to Portland today to represent the University of Oregon in the annual track and field meet of the Pacific Northwest Athletic Association Saturday. Captain Walter McClure, Olympic distance runner, will not be one of the delegation.

The reason that Hayward is leaving McClure behind is that the rangy runner has turned out for practice only one night since the conference meet almost two weeks ago. "Captain or no captain," says Hayward, "all candidates look alike to me." McClure pleads a badly strained tendon in his right leg. The Oregon captain has been out of condition the entire season.

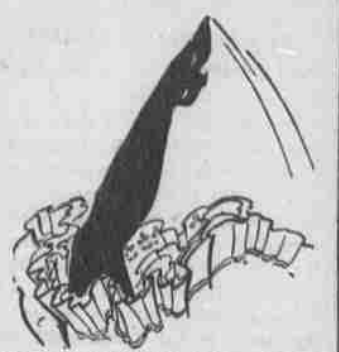

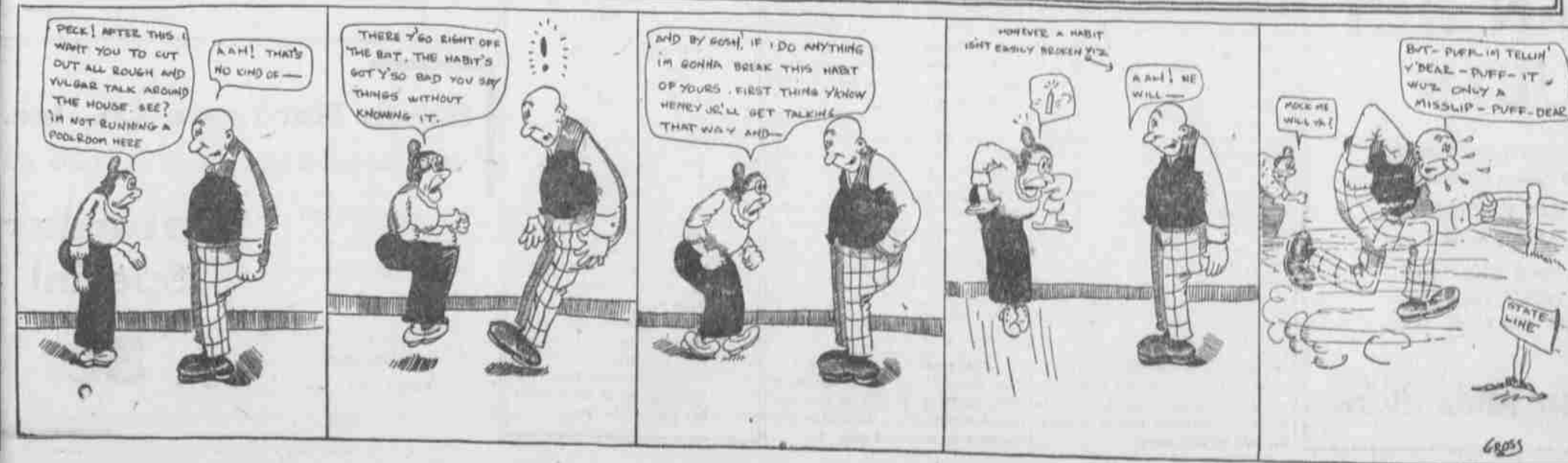
