MINORITY REPORT RAPS HIGH OFFICIALS

Chancellor of Exchequer and Solicitor-General Scored in Marconi Shares Scandal.

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.] London, June 13.—The house of commons committee which has been investigating the "Marconi shares scandal" today presented a report to parliament absolutely exonerating Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd George and Solicitor-General Isaacs from any wrong doing in connection with their purchase of Marconi shares.

The committee found that both cabinet officers acted in the belief that their transactions in American Marconi stock did not in any way conflict with their official responsibilities. The committee report said there was no evidence of corruption.

In a minority report, which was headed by Lord Robert Cecil, the findings of the majority of the committee were disagreed with. In the minority report both cabinet officers were censured and it was declared they had been guilty of grave improprieties.
