HUNDREDS MAY BE VICTIMS OF CYCLONE AND BIG TIDAL WAVE

Most of the Fatalities Occur in Section of Florida Inhabited by Blacks.

IMPOSSIBLE TO RESCUE

Details Are Difficult to Obtain as Direct Communication Has Not Been Established

Tallahassee, Fla., June 20.—At least two negroes are known to be dead and 18 others possibly killed in a cyclone which visited this section.

In measure details of the storm already learned the list of fatalities increased. Direct communication with the stricken district has not yet been established.

GETS IN BAD FOR HIS REMARKS ABOUT JUDGE

London, June 20.—Dr. Charles Aked, of San Francisco, who in declaring his intention to become an American citizen, said his action was prompted by a long conceived dislike of kings, is coming in for much sarcastic comment today from English newspaper writers.

Cabinet Quits

Melbourne, June 20.—The cabinet headed by Andrew Fisher, premier of Australia, resigned today because the liberals at the last election obtained a majority of one in the house of representatives over the labor party.

Washington, June 20.—Demanding that the money trust probe be resumed, Representative Neeley of Kansas made a speech in the house today, in which he denounced the New York stock exchange and the clearing house association in bitter terms.

Question Arises as to Divorcees

Said Seattle Judge Is Likely to Decide They Are Entitled to Mothers' Pensions.

Seattle, Wash., June 20.—Is a divorced woman entitled to the mothers' pension if she is left with children, in destitute circumstances?

This is the question that will have to be decided by Judge Frater. A number of divorcees are included among approximately 100 applicants for mothers' pensions, the law providing which has now been in effect for a week.

GOLDEN HAired GIRL NOW UNIDENTIFIED

One of Fourteen Victims of Head-on Collision Between Electric Trains.

Valejo, Cal., June 20.—Fourteen, possibly 15, lives probably will be the toll of death taken before night as the result of the head-on collision between the Castigo-San Francisco flyer and the regular southbound train on the Napa Valley electric railroad near here.

Most of the 24 injured, who were brought to the general hospital here, are doing as well as could be expected. Only two of the sufferers are believed to be in a dangerous condition, and it is their names which are expected to swell the original death list to 15.

Mrs. A. Gail, of San Francisco, is suffering from a possible fracture of the spine, and is partially paralyzed. Louis Silverman, also of San Francisco, has a fractured skull, and may also die during the day.

The body of the little golden-haired girl killed outright was identified at the morgue today as that of Helen Bandy, of San Francisco, 8 years old. Identification was made through Maurice O. Fitzmaurice, an attorney of San Francisco, who was himself seriously injured in the wreck, but returned to San Francisco. The child was en route to Napa, in charge of F. H. Dayton, a St. Louis traveling man, a relative of her family. Dayton was instantly killed.

AUSTRALIAN MEAT IMPORTERS WIN

Succeeded in Having Rescinded an Objectionable Meat Inspection Order at San Francisco.

San Francisco, June 20.—Importers of Australian meats are victorious today in having rescinded an objectionable federal inspection order which threatened to stop further shipments of frozen meats from the South Seas.

DEMOCRATS BELIEVED TO BE BADLY SPLIT ON TARIFF MEASURE

Possible That Enough Will Oppose Final Passage to Kill Bill.

THOSE CLOSELY WATCHED

Walsh, Shafroth and Newlands May Break Away, and This Will Mean Very Narrow Margin.

Washington, June 20.—Senator Simmons, chairman of the senate finance committee, today presented to the Democratic senate caucus his committee's draft of the tariff bill. Senators Randall and Thornton will oppose the measure on final passage.

Simmons today declared he was confident that the caucus would develop the votes necessary to pass the bill, and plans to offer a resolution binding all Democrats to its support on final passage.

The tariff bill as presented to the Democratic caucus contains many reductions and additions to the free list. Wheat, cattle, sheep, wheat flour, textbooks and beet and sugar cane machinery are added to the free list.

CLEVELAND GOES INTO ICE BUSINESS TEMPORARILY

Cincinnati, O., June 20.—The city went into the ice business today in order to alleviate suffering resulting from a strike of 350 ice wagon drivers.

Engineers and firemen of many plants went out on strike today in sympathy with the ice wagon drivers.

WILSON WILL DELIVER HIS MESSAGE PERSONALLY

Washington, June 20.—President Wilson will deliver personally to a joint session of the house and senate on Monday his message on reform of the currency, if the senate concurs in a resolution adopted by the lower house, providing for such a session.

LUNATIC SLAUGHTERS 3 AND WOUNDS 10

Enters Catholic School and Pours Violets Into Groups of Little Children.

Bremen, Germany, June 20.—A lunatic with a revolver in each hand, entered a Catholic school here today, killed three girls and wounded ten others before he could be overpowered.

The insane man then stood at the window and poured a volley of shots into a group of boys playing outside, wounding five. His last to kill, apparently satisfied, the lunatic fled, but was captured by a mob and almost beaten to death before he was rescued by the police.

WALN IS HURT WHEN HIT BY AUTOMOBILE

Sustains Bruises, Clothing Is Torn and Bicycle Is Damaged When Fast Car Approars.

Lawn Waln, the well-known collector for the Salem Water Company, was thrown from his bicycle this morning on South Commercial street and sustained bruises as the result of a speeding automobile striking his machine from the rear.

According to the police, who were called to investigate the accident, the automobile skidded over 40 feet after it had collided with Mr. Waln.

Mr. Waln told the police that he was traveling north on Commercial street, near the Salem Water Works on the right hand side of the thoroughfare and the automobile rushed up from behind and ran into him.

NAVY AVIATOR FALLS 1600 FEET TO DEATH

Head of Aviation School With Him Is Badly Hurt, But Will Survive, It Is Believed.

Annapolis, Md., June 20.—Ensign William D. Billingsley, a navy aviator, was killed today while making a hydroplane flight over Chesapeake Bay. Flying at an altitude of 1600 feet over the water, he fell from the machine and was dead when picked up.

Lieutenant J. H. Towers, head of the aviation school, was aloft with Billingsley. He clung to the machine when it turned turtle, and escaped with bad but not fatal bruises.

NEW ERA OF PROSPERITY DAWNING ON PACIFIC OCEAN

JUMPS TO DEATH IN RIVER AFTER TRYING TO MURDER WOMAN

Portland Young Man Said to Have Been Infatuated With Married Girl

Tacoma, Wash., June 20.—Falling in a desperate attempt to hurl Mrs. Ruth Francis Allen, aged 19 years, from the Eleventh street bridge in the downtown district, Edward W. Mygott, aged 23 years, of Portland, jumped off the tower span of the bridge early today, sustaining injuries which resulted in his death an hour later at the county hospital.

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SAYS SHE EVADED HIM

Tried to Escape Mygott by Flying Up and Down Coast But He Followed Her to Tacoma.

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TRIED TO ESCAPE MYGOTT BY FLYING UP AND DOWN COAST BUT HE FOLLOWED HER TO TACOMA

The young woman is at the police station pending an investigation of the tragedy by the police. Mrs. Allen whose husband, George Allen, is in New York, declares that Mygott forced his attentions upon her until she was driven almost to distraction.

Mygott, however, saw her board the train and also purchased a ticket, remaining in another part of the same train.

TRIES TO SHOVE HER OVER

When Mrs. Allen arrived at Tacoma she obtained a taxicab, planning to take a steamer to Seattle. Suddenly Mygott appeared, and leaping into the cab gave the driver orders to go to the municipal dock. Here the machine was stopped and Mygott seized Mrs. Allen and attempted to throw her over the bridge. Two men nearby went to her assistance, and beat the frantic man off.

FOILED IN HIS ATTEMPT TO DESTROY MRS. ALLEN

Mygott leaped over the rail and landed on the ground 60 feet below.

At the hospital he died. Mygott declared that he was angry at the woman because she left her baby in Portland.

LETTER TO HIS MOTHER

In the dead man's possession was found a letter to his mother at Independence, Mo. It reads in part: "For what I am about to do I want to ask your forgiveness. I expect I am going to hell, and know you will go to heaven. I have been driven almost insane over Ruth, and I don't know what to do."

MIXING AT TROUTDALE
