## WANT AIR CRAFT EXCLUDED FROM WAR

British Peace Society Will Make Important Recommendations at Hague Conference.

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE] London, June 21.—Entire prohibition of the use of aeroplanes and other air craft as instruments of warfare, "thus excluding the possibility of a new horror to civilization, and an added peril to life," is among the recommendations of the British Peace society, for consideration at the next Hague conference.

The other suggestions of the society, to which Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey has promised to give careful consideration are:

Provision of a general treaty of obligatory arbitration.

Establishment of an arbitral court of justice.

Declaration of the immunity of private property at sea in time of war.

Abolition of purely commercial blockade, that is, of places which are not fortified.

Prohibition of explosive mines, at least in waters lawfully used by neutral ships.

An agreement to put a check on the growth of naval and military armaments.

NATION-WIDE STRIKE IS PROBABLE, SAYS LEADER

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE] Chicago, June 21.—Union men from Maine to California are awaiting the word from Chicago to tie up construction throughout the nation, in sympathy with the workers locked out here by the Building Construction Employers Association, according to President Simon O'Donnell of the Building Trades Council.

"I have heard from the leading unions of the country," O'Donnell said today, "and all that is necessary is for us to give the word. They feel that we have been unfairly treated and have offered co-operation. Tying up so much work would cripple the country. We will hold out until the last minute before taking such drastic action."

STRONG WEB OF EVIDENCE AROUND YOUNG DEARING

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE] Lewiston, Idaho, June 21.—That a strong web of evidence is being woven about James Dearing, held in jail here on a charge of the murder of his uncle, George Dearing, became known today when Sheriff Elmers questioned members of the Dearing family regarding the estrangement known to have existed between uncle and nephew for months.

Dearing was found dead on a remote part of his ranch near Grangeville, late Thursday night, indications showing that he was killed by a high-power rifle. The suicide theory was short-lived, as the bullet was clean cut and apparently quade by a missile fired from ambush.
