SOUTHERN PACIFIC GIVES BOND IN BIG LAND TRIAL

Portland, Or., June 25.—Judge Wolverton in federal court yesterday fixed at \$100,000 the bond of the Southern Pacific railroad company in its appeal from the decree of the same judge in declaring forfeited to the government 2,900,000 acres of land in Oregon and California. The amount of bond was placed at the recommendation of B. D. Townsend, special assistant to the attorney general, who investigated charges that the railroad was not complying with the terms of the government land grant and instituted suit which resulted last April in Judge Wolverton's order that the land revert to the United States. The standing of numerous settlers on this vast tract is involved in the litigation, many having taken claims on the understanding that when the reversion took place they would have earned rights to prove up on homesteads. This view is not held by Lewis Sharp, of the local land office, who declares the land must be formally thrown open by congressional enactment before settlers may establish any claim whatever.
