What a nuisance they knew her when she--"how is, anyhow!"

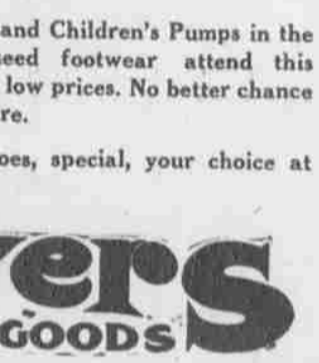
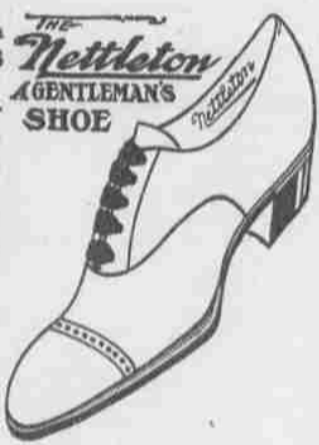
Come, come, old neighbor--don't keep your eyes shut so tight--open them and you'll see something interesting.

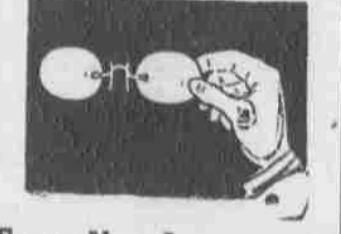
