ANOTHER COMPANY OF MILITIA PROPOSED

Vacancy in State's National Guard of One Company and Another One Here Will Fill It.

If the plans that were made last night by the members of the local Spanish War Veterans materialize, Salem will soon be the proud possessor of another company of national guardsmen. At a meeting held by the veterans in the armory, the movement to add another company to Company M, O. N. G., was endorsed and immediate steps will be taken to organize the necessary seventy-five men to make up the new assembly.

With another company of militiamen, the Capital City will be the second district in the state in military service. At the present time there is a vacancy in the state's national guard of one company, and this vacancy, it is hoped, will be filled by Salem men. There are quarters already prepared in the new armory here for another company and all that remains to be done to perfect such an organization, is to advise Uncle Samuel and receive the equipment.

Veterans Do Much.

The Spanish War Veterans in Salem are doing much, not only toward the development of their own organization, but lending unstinted aid in upbuilding the Oregon National Guard in every particular. It is likely that the members of the local veteran organization will lead in forming another company and at the meeting held last night, each individual vet. gave assurance that he would do all within his power to make the proposition a success.

Col. C. H. Martin, of Portland, will be in the city shortly and at that time the matter of forming a new company will be definitely settled.

Another fine thing that has been done for Salem by the veterans is that at the encampment held in Eugene by the S. W. V. of the state, local representatives succeeded in getting the next encampment for this city. It was decided at the next assembly of the state representatives of the organization will be held in Salem during the Cherry Fair of next year, the date of the encampment being unknown until the Cherry Fair committee names same.

LIND HAS BAD NEWS FOR RULER HUERTA

Scheduled to Tell Head of Mexican Government He Will Not Be Recognized by Wilson.

Washington, Aug. 5.—Envoys Lind to-day is on route to Mexico. His instructions are elastic and he carries what practically are plenary powers to act for the president and the United States.

Before he started on his trip Lind and the president, with Secretary Bryan, held a lengthy conference in which every possible contingency was considered. Lind's first task will be to communicate with influential Mexicans who have indirectly advised President Wilson that they are working for a reconciliation of the Mexican factions.

To these men Lind will make it clear that recognition of Huerta by the United States is impossible. This is the first step of the administration's policy. The following steps will not be made public until Lind's reports. The president expresses the greatest hopefulness that Lind's mission will succeed.

BODIES BLOWN TO BITS

Kollogg, Idaho, Aug. 5.—Their bodies literally blown to bits, Romeo Albinola and C. P. Martin, employed at the Nabob mine, are today dead as the result of an explosion of dynamite in the mine shaft. The men, who were lighting fuses, remained in the shaft too long, despite the warnings of their companions, who escaped injury. Five men have been killed in mines in this section in the past week.

WANTS TO HELP REBELS
