AN APPRECIATION OF MAURICE McLOUGHLIN

Something About Young Man Who Won Such High Honors for United States in England.

Barely 23, Maurice E. McLoughlin, the American champion, who continues to charm Wimbledon crowds daily with his terrific service and dazzling strokes...

Who will ever forget his first appearance in the center court on initial day, when he was opposed to the ablest general we have at the game, H. B. Barrett. It was admittedly an ordeal...

It is stress on this point, as it is remarkable how well he bore himself on one remembers how many great players (his own country included) he signally failed to do themselves justice at Wimbledon.

And what a fine temperament he has! Nothing seems to ruffle him. Serious and concentrated as he clearly shows himself to be when playing the game, there is with it all a pleasant and good determination to take the road that he had luck which happens to be his way in the spirit in which it would be taken.

His first came across McLoughlin in 1908, when, though only 19, he was still open as likely to become a worthy successor to W. A. Larned and other famous Americans. He did not try against us in the Davis cup that year, but Parke, Cecil Crawley and I served several practice sets with him, and we frequently had the pleasure of watching him play.

It was perhaps even more brilliant than that won. At that time he chiefed the reverse American service; was later he adopted the ordinary American service for good. I will remember him playing in a practice double at Philadelphia, partnered by George Melville Long, against Larned and Bob Wrenn, and he won four clean sets (as the Yankees say) off his regular service, neither Larned nor Wrenn, touching one of them. Larned, in his position as striker-out, casually threw his racket over his left shoulder, and with a broad grin, admiring the ball fly off McLoughlin's delivery as to the side line; and seeing that he disappear into the stands.

McLoughlin and only went down in the fifth set, after leading 2-love in it. He beat me afterwards, 3 sets to 1. His service, the same as he now uses, is a far more difficult stroke to return on the West Side courts than on the plumbed courts at Wimbledon. At the former you never knew what the ball was going to do. There is something about the position he assumes just before delivering his service which forebodes disaster to his opponents. A determined look, as much as to say, "Now I've got a special hot one for you," and if the first does fall within the limits the striker-out has a busy time of it.

No other service I know of quite combines the break and pace of McLoughlin's. His second, though slower, has just as much spin, and is one that few players would care to take liberties with. His top-spin fore-hand drive, though different from Wilding's, is another of his deadly weapons, and this he uses far more than he did, and with much more success, it taking the place of a cut drive, which he now sparingly employs and what a smash the boy possesses! Has anybody ever seen any one hit harder?

A charming personality has McLoughlin, and if he is able to continue playing the game he will emulate, if not eclipse, the successor of his great predecessor, W. A. Larned.

WORKING HOURS OF GIRLS FIXED BY COMMISSION. [UNITED PRESS LEASER WIRE.] Portland, Ore., Aug. 6.—According to a ruling made by the Oregon Industrial Commission yesterday afternoon all girls under 18 years of age may work but eight hours and twenty minutes a day or 50 hours a week, and may not work after 6 p. m. and all girls between the ages of 16 and 18 must receive a minimum of \$1 a day except when arrangements have been made with the commission for apprentices or learners.
