BOURNE BOOST HIS BIG ROAD-BUILDING SCHEME

Portland, Ore., Aug. 11.—Development of the government-aided road project, provided for in the plan mapped out by former Senator Bourne will add \$10,000,000,000 to the wealth of the state, according to the former senatorial representative of Oregon, who is in Portland today for a general relaxation from the rigors of Washington.

His plan involves a vast issue of government three per cent bonds, the proceeds of which shall be furnished to individual states in return for an equal face value of four per cent state bonds, which shall be deposited with the secretary of the treasury. The difference between the three and four per cent bonds, he plans will take up the principal in 50 years, so that in that period the state bonds may be redeemed. In addition, the government and individual states are to co-operate in maintenance, each contributing two per cent of the total bonds.

Bourne pointed out that the aid of the government is to be supplied the state at the initiation of the state itself, which shall bear all the

burdens of planning and building, backed by the government in a financial way.

JOSLYN FINALLY FREE.

San Francisco, Aug. 11.—The case against Dr. Otto C. Joslyn, a wealthy physician here, charged with a statutory offense against Ethel Williams, formerly of Seattle, was dismissed today by Superior Judge Lawlor as a result of the continued absence of the complaining witness from the state. Miss Williams left California shortly after Dr. Joslyn's second trial and resulted in a disagreement.

SUIT FOR \$50,000 DAMAGES IS STARTED

Complaint Filed by Priores of Convent at Mount Angel Against Silver-ton Publisher.

ARTICLE IN PAPER DECLARED BOTH MALICIOUS AND UNTRUE

Affidavit Relating to Alleged Escape of Nun From Mt. Angel is Basis of Suit Here.

A complaint has been filed in the circuit court by the priores of the Benedictine convent at Mt. Angel against J. E. Hosmer, the publisher of the Silver-ton Journal, in which real damages in the sum of \$25,000 and punitive damages in the sum of \$25,000 are asked on the grounds of slander brought about by the alleged malicious and spiteful publication in the defendant's paper of an article written by Rev. Leon Meyers, pastor of the Christian church, of Silverton, and an affidavit containing charges made by one Miss Lasenan, (sister name, Mary Louise).

In the article alleged to have been printed in the paper and signed by the minister of the Silverton Christian church, it is alleged in the complaint that it says that Miss Lasenan told the clergyman that she escaped from the convent in the robes of a nun and that coming to the Christian church, inquired for the pastor.

Kidnaping Alleged.

The minister's statement, which appears in the complaint, then says that he advised her to secrete herself in the basement of the church until the services had been closed, and later, in the presence of H. C. Seymour, of Dallas, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Reynolds, of Eugene, Miss Grace Young, of Eugene and himself, the young woman stated that after escaping from a convent in the east, she was kidnaped in Portland while on her way home from work and taken as a prisoner and confined in the convent at Mt. Angel.

While there, alleges the affidavit in the complaint, Miss Lasenan alleged that she performed servile work as penance for past sins; was abused by the priests and Mother Superior. The affidavit sets forth that the priests from all over the valley gathered at Mt. Angel and held a drunken orgy and that she, being unable to bear longer their alleged "unmentionable treatment" of her and other nuns who took the black veil, made her escape.

Makes Murder Charge.

The affidavit, as attached to the complaint filed by the plaintiff, alleges that the woman told the minister and others that she would be murdered if caught and that she knows of several nuns who have been murdered in the same way. She stated, alleges the affidavit, that she would rather die than submit herself any more to the "heinous treatment."

Miss Lasenan is quoted in the affidavit as saying that the Roman Catholics have had as their aim to secure control of the United States government especially since losing their foothold in the governments of Europe.

In the article alleged to have been written by Rev. Leon Meyers and which appears in the complaint, he states that all liberty-loving citizens should become agents in the "anti-Catholic campaign which seems to be sweeping the country from coast to coast and from the lakes to the Gulf."

ENDORSE GOVERNMENT WHITE SLAVERY FIGHT

Milwaukee, Aug. 11.—More than 10,000 delegates and visitors are here for the meeting of Catholic societies, including the largest group of Catholic dignitaries ever gathered in the west.

President Charles Donohue, of Boston, in his annual report endorsed the government crusade against white slavery, and called upon the members of the association personally to support it. He scored the "tendency of playwrights and producers to foist improper plays upon the public."

Archbishop Messmer announced today that the Catholic Women of America will be organized into an independent woman's league.

By cable, Pope Pius conferred the order of St. George on Anthony Matro, secretary of the federation.

TURKEY DECLINES TO EVACUATE ADRIANOPLE

Constantinople, Aug. 11.—Flat refusal to evacuate Adrianople was voiced today by Turkey in a courteous note handed to representatives of the powers here. The note explained that the invasion of the Media-Maritsa zone was forced as a result of Bulgarian atrocities.

PAROLED MAN SAID TO BE CHECK FORGER

Chester Huffman, Sentenced Some Time Ago and Released, Under Arrest at County Jail.

Living up to his promise, made to Judge Kelly, to conduct himself properly in the future, at the time he was sentenced to serve from two to 20 years in the penitentiary for the crime of forgery, for a period of but five months, Chester Huffman, a young man residing near Liberty, was placed under arrest again today by Sheriff Esch and he is now being held to answer to the charge of having committed in this city last Saturday night.

Huffman is charged with forgery, committed by issuing bad paper to Patton's book store, the J. C. Perry Drug Co., and, it is thought by the officers, several other merchants in Salem have been made the victim of his unlawful ways of obtaining money.

Gets Frightened.

According to the sheriff, Huffman passed a worthless check on the book store for \$8 and then attempted to perform the same trick on the Bybee poultry market, but became frightened and fled. He called at the market Saturday night and laying down a check for \$8, asked for fifty cents worth of fish. Bybee stepped out to get some one to identify him, and Huffman is said to have run through the Ferguson restaurant to the alley, leaving the check in Bybee's shop.

The matter was placed in the hands of the police and yesterday afternoon the clues were turned over to Sheriff Esch, who, feeling that some person near the city has been passing many worthless checks here, suspected Huffman. Upon investigation, those who observed Huffman in the Bybee store and other places where he offered his bad checks, identified Huffman nicely and Sheriff Esch went to the O. B. Miles ranch near Liberty and arrested the young man. Huffman denies that he tried to pass the checks, but a comparison of the hand-writing he gave the sheriff with the endorsement on the checks taken up, lead the officer to believe that there is no mistaking the person issuing same and that he is Huffman.

Faces Long Sentence.

Although Huffman is but 23 years old, he is now facing a long sentence in the penitentiary unless he be granted another parole, which is not likely under the circumstances in the event he either pleads guilty or is found guilty by the court. After having passed many forged checks on different parties in the city six months ago and finally arrested, he was taken before Judge Kelly. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to the prison for a term of from two to 20 years, but, owing to his age and he being charged with the first crime he had ever committed, the court paroled him from the bench conditioned however, that the lad would conduct himself as a law-abiding citizen and keep out of trouble.

It is more than probable that Huffman's parole will be revoked and that he will be compelled to serve out the original sentence.

NEW YORK MEN ARE CALLED TO TESTIFY

Will Give Evidence in Lobby Probe in Regard to National Tariff Commission.

Washington, Aug. 11.—At the request of the National Association of Manufacturers, Senator Overman, of North Carolina, chairman of the committee investigating President Wilson's "insidious lobby" charges, today subpoenaed three New York men to be examined in regard to the formation of the National Tariff Commission Association. This organization, Chief Counsel Emery, of the N. A. M., has testified, was formed by New York manufacturers, a number of whom are members of the N. A. M.

Martin Mulhall, of Baltimore, former chief lobbyist for the N. A. M., whose examination before the senate committee was recently completed, appeared before the house lobby committee, of which Representative Garrett, of Tennessee, is chairman. Mulhall declared he got his title of "Colonel" while accompanying the late President William McKinley on a campaign tour of Ohio in 1893. McKinley, he said, called him "Colonel."

The house committee also read into the record a letter from Representative Richard Bartholdt, of Missouri, who is now in Germany, offering to answer any questions propounded by cable. He declared he could not return to the United States at once without endangering the life of Mrs. Bartholdt. In his letter Bartholdt declared he never regarded Mulhall as anything but a messenger boy for Emery and other officials of the N. A. M., and that "his dignity would never permit him to discuss pending measures with Mulhall."

WOMAN KILLS HERSELF WITH DOSE OF POISON

Coroner Clough received news this afternoon of the suicide three miles from Gervais, of Mrs. John Shepard, who swallowed poison and died before a physician arrived. She was living with her second husband and had threatened suicide several times, claiming that she was unhappy.

The coroner also received news of the accidental drowning of a 12-year-old boy eight miles from Silverton Sunday. His informant did not know the boy's name.

GRIEVED OVER DEATH OF GIRL WHO SHOT HERSELF

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 11.—Irene Noble, aged 29, who was shot through the neck May 30, while alone with her fiancée, Fred C. Kolb, and has since lain half-paralyzed in a hospital, died today. Kolb, exhibiting signs of great grief, was at her bedside.

Following the shooting, Miss Noble accused Kolb and he was arrested. After he had been in jail six weeks, the girl asserted that she had shot herself accidentally while struggling with Kolb for possession of a revolver with which she had threatened to commit suicide. Kolb was released.
