Tom Kay, the Portland "detective," is in the city and has been for several days investigating the conditions here with regard to the sale of liquors and the manner in which saloons are being conducted. From statements made daily in the news columns of the Portland papers, it would seem there was plenty of work of this kind to keep him busy at home, but then the salary and emoluments generally point unworringly to the place where duty lies.

Circuit Judge Galloway will hear evidence in Portland this week in the case to have the petitions for reference to the people of the workmen's compensation act thrown out on a charge of fraud. The hearing is expected to last most of the week. All the witnesses live in Portland. The case will be argued here. E. E. Ringo is chief counsel for the plaintiff. It is charged that signatures to the petitions were obtained through fraud and the court is asked to restrain the secretary of state from placing the ballots at the special election in November. Attorney General Crawford probably will have nothing to do with the case until it reaches the supreme court. Secretary of State Olcott says fraud must be shown before he can act.

William H. Johnson, of this city, has been elected president of the Bank of Jacksonville, to succeed C. M. Ruch. Mr. Johnson will devote his entire time to the bank's affairs.

### LOG BUILDING FAVORED BY OREGON COMMISSION

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Portland, Or., Aug. 11.—In a formal statement issued today the Oregon exposition commission, which returned from San Francisco Sunday, expresses great satisfaction with the site selected for Oregon's building at the Panama exposition.

On account of the smallness of the appropriation, the commission favors the construction of a log building, which will make up in individuality what it lack in costliness.

The commission will endeavor to have the Oregon building the first one completed among state structures.

### TO TEST ALASKAN COAL.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Vallejo, Cal., Aug. 11.—The cruiser Maryland arrived at Mare Island navy yard to remain until September 1, when it will start on a cruise to test 700 tons of Alaskan coal, taken from Controller Bay. If the test is successful, northern coal will be burned on all Pacific warships and auxiliary vessels.

### MARKET CLOSES WELL.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Aug. 11.—The stock market showed losses and gains about evenly divided, in the early trading, though most of the active issues were under last week's closing figures. Canadian Pacific was up 1. Southern Pacific dropped 1, and elsewhere the market was irregular. Bonds were irregular. The market closed buoyant.
