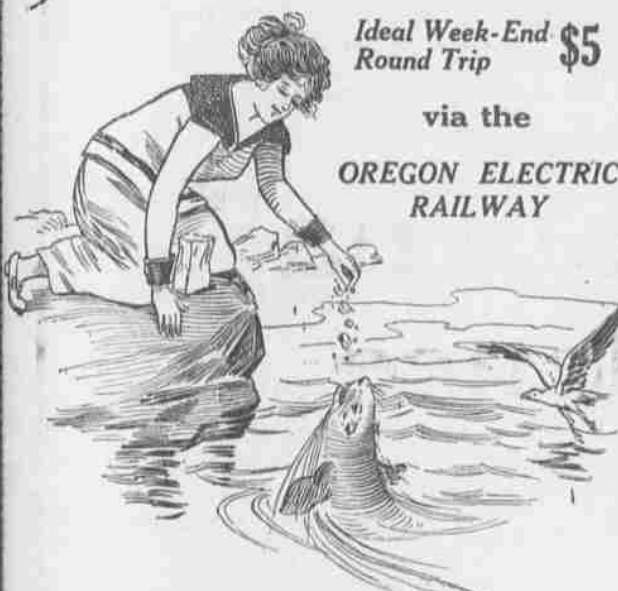

MARSHA WARRINGTON SHOWS HIM NO MERCY

(UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.)

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—Marsha Warrington dealt the defense in the case of Maury I. Diggs a telling blow when she took the stand late yesterday afternoon, and commenced her testimony as to the escapade with Diggs, which ended in their arrest at Reno. It was a complete "throw down," as far as Diggs was concerned.

Marsha Warrington is a strikingly pretty blonde of 20. Her blue eyes are set well apart, her brows are widely arched, her nose is small and straight, the contour of her countenance is oval and regular. She wore the same smartly tailored suit of shepherd's plaid she had on when arrested, black pumps and white gloves. A white veil hid her complexion and masked the appeal of her lowered gaze. Occasionally she raised her large eyes to gaze for a moment at the judge from under the brim of a basket hat, covered with pink silk over straw and trimmed with black tulle.

During the three-quarters of an hour she was on the stand Diggs never took his eyes from her face. Not once did she allow her gaze to meet his and she was soon quite mistress of herself and the situation.

"I am 20 years old," began Miss Warrington, "and I live with my father and stepmother. My mother died when I was 5 years old."

"I have known Maury I. Diggs since last September, and we were close friends. Two weeks before we left for Reno, while Drew Caminetti, Miss Norris and I were riding with Diggs in his machine, he told me that there was a scandal about to be published about the four of us, and that we would have to leave town. I was surprised, but he said we would have to go."

Faith in Diggs Declared.

"Miss Norris was told and Caminetti joined Diggs in urging that we leave immediately. They told us that we would be arrested and subjected to the third degree."

"Did you know that Diggs and Caminetti were married at that time?"

"Yes, and Miss Norris knew it, too. Diggs told me that his relations with his wife were unpleasant; that he was unhappy and wanted to leave town. He said he had an affection for me, cared more for me than he did for his wife. I believed him."

"He manifested love for me; he kissed me; discussed marriage with me and said he would get a divorce and marry me."

"Caminetti told Lola the same thing."

"Did you have an affection for him?"

"Yes, I had a strong affection for

him. We discussed leaving town together several times. They told us that Diggs' father and Caminetti's father were going to prosecute us two and that Diggs (Sr.) was giving an attorney named Harris large sums of money to keep the story out of the papers."

"We said we couldn't go. I said I couldn't go away from father, that it would kill him. Diggs said it would all come out in the papers, anyway."

"Miss Norris said it would kill her mother and Caminetti and Diggs told us that our parents would soon get over it. They kept urging us to go immediately."

Finally Decided on Reno.

"On Saturday, March 8, Diggs returned from San Francisco on a business trip. He called us to a cafe, told us his father was coming up from Berkeley the following Monday to put Caminetti in jail, and have us prosecuted."

"The next day we met again and the men finally decided on Reno, after considering Salt Lake City and Los Angeles. We tried to back out. We said we would just as soon stay and take chances on the scandal. They told us we couldn't back out."

"That night we met in a cafe. Caminetti went out to get some money. We went to the railway station and while there a train for Reno was pulling out. I told Diggs I would stay in Sacramento. He said he cared too much for me, and I would have to go."

"Caminetti did not come back with the money, and we missed that train. Later we met Caminetti at the cafe, and at midnight went to the station again. When we got there Diggs told us to wait where we were, and he went over and bought four tickets."

"We got in a Pullman car, and Diggs engaged a drawing room. He paid the Pullman conductor. I saw him give the railroad conductor the tickets for our trip to Reno. Miss Norris and Caminetti took the upper berth and Diggs and I had the lower."

"We arrived at Reno the next day—the 10th—at about noon, and went to a cafe for something to eat."

At this point the court took an adjournment until this morning at 10 o'clock.

OBITUARY.

Levi D. Libby was born in Bangor, Maine, in 1841, moved to Minnesota in 1858. In August, 1862, he enlisted in the Seventh regiment, company D, Minnesota volunteers, and served three years; was mustered out August 19, 1865; was married to Miss Jane Walker in 1866, and in 1901 moved to Washington, and in 1910 moved to Salem, Oregon, where he resided until his death, August 10, 1913.

He leaves to mourn his loss a wife and six children and one brother, Chas. Libby, of Minnesota; Mrs. Ben Terveer, of Emerson, Wash.; Mr. Osman Libby, of Bellingham, Wash.; Mrs. Charlie Crippen, of St. Charles, Minn.; Mr. Forest Libby, of Vancouver, B. C.; Mrs. Louis Reeves, of Bandon, Oregon, and Mr. Alonzo Libby, of Salem, Ore.

The funeral will be held at 5 p. m. Thursday at the chapel of Lehman & Clough. Burial at City View cemetery.
