Misses Margaret and Frances Gittens of Amity were guests Tuesday and today of their brother, Edward.

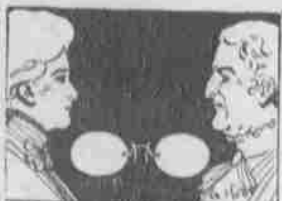

County Clerk Gehlhar today issued a marriage license to William Lord and Elsie Cardner, both of Salem.

Gene M. Simpson, superintendent of the state game farm near Corvallis, was in the city today in consultation with Secretary Meredith with reference to a state game exhibit at the forthcoming state fair.

Thomas Henry Baker was given a conditional pardon from the prison today. He was a deserter from the ship Celtic King, and as this ship will be in the harbor at Portland today, the pardon was granted so that he could be returned to the ship, and deported. This will save the state the expense of taking care of him, and at the same time will insure him getting about all the punishment that is coming to him. He was taken to Portland this afternoon.

George L. Rose and others, living in the hop district between Orville and Sidney have had their request for a station stop at Lowell granted. Superintendent Davidson is pushing the work of filling with gravel and the construction of a standard platform. The local Oregon Electric trains will begin making stops at Lowell for the accommodation of hop-pickers some time after the 15th of August. The station is to be made convenient of access for handling hop-pickers, their luggage and supplies that come by electric line.

Rev. R. F. Fischer, 660 Union street, pastor of the Unitarian church, who recently arrived in Salem, had a burglar as a visitor last evening. The burglar is supposed to be a youth, and he crawled through a window. He was flashing his lantern around, when Mrs. Fischer called to him, thinking it was her daughter. There was no reply. Rev. Fischer called in a louder voice. Evidently badly scared, the intruder dashed to the window and made his getaway. He secured nothing.

The celebration of the opening of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern railway from Monroe to Corvallis will be held at Monroe Wednesday, September 3. The fare for the round trip from Eugene to Monroe will be \$1 and a similar rate will be made from Corvallis, which is lower than the excursion rates permissible after the opening of the lines and in regular operation. It is understood that Governor Oswald West and other noted men from different parts of the state are expected to be present, besides all the higher officials of the road. A number of officials of the Southern Pacific Company's Oregon lines will also doubtless be on hand.
