**SALEM PHYSICIAN IN MEXICAN BATTLE ZONE**

House Hit by Bullets During Bombardment of Capital of Mexico Only a Few Months Ago.

PART OF HIS FURNITURE AND INSTRUMENTS RUINED

Decides Salem Is Good Place to Live and Is Now Engaged in Practice in This City.

Dr. G. A. Wislicenus, who came to Salem some weeks ago, with a view of settling here as physician, has just received word from the Oregon State Board of Medical Examiners, that he has passed the examination and acquired by this the right of practicing medicine in the state of Oregon. Dr. Wislicenus is, in spite of his strange-sounding name, a German. He was trained in the best German Universities at Berlin and Munich, and has had an additional five years' experience as an assistant physician in several large hospitals in Germany. From 1908 up to the spring of this year he practiced medicine at Mexico City, but although he had built up a good practice there he finally decided to leave that country on account of the continuous revolutions and the economic conditions growing worse from year to year.

During the bombardment of the capital and the battle raging in the streets in the spring of this year his house was hit by numerous shells and bullets, and a great part of his furniture and medical instruments were destroyed.

In the fall of 1912 Dr. Wislicenus wrote a letter to P. E. Schwab, who at that time was assistant secretary to the local Board of Trade, inquiring what his chances would be in the state of Oregon, and especially at Salem. Mr. Schwab answered him that Salem would be a good place for him to live, and a good field with regard to his profession too, as none of the physicians practicing here speak German, and there is a great number of Germans in the city, as well as in the surrounding farming district, part of whom, especially the women, have no sufficient knowledge of English. After coming to Oregon, Dr. Wislicenus looked up different localities, but by none of them he was as favorably impressed as by Salem, so he finally resolved to make this city his home.

He is located in the Hubbard building.

**The Markets**

The wheat market is sluggish, buyers and sellers both waiting developments. But little grain is moving, arrivals being less than for some time and far below the average. There appears to be lively war in the banana trade, and prices of 4 cents a pound will be slashed. The hop situation remains unchanged. The New York Commercial sizes up the prune situation as follows: "The Pacific Coast crop will not exceed 45,000 tons, of which fully 20,000 tons have already been sold to Europe. The supply needed in this country runs from 75,000,000 to 100,000,000 pounds, or about the entire crop of the Pacific coast." The peach crop of the Virginia orchards at Wenatchee, Wash., has been sold at 25 cents advance, and the dealers expect to make the crop pay the grower 60 cents a box. The crop this year it is expected will amount to 80 carloads. Chicago packers say beef is going to be at unheard of prices, and predict 50 cents for the best cuts.

Vallejo, Cal. Aug. 21.—The first electric driven vessel ever constructed took a trial spin here yesterday afternoon over the San Francisco bay, when the United States collier Jupiter left Mare Island at 3 o'clock with Commander J. M. Reeves in charge. Commander G. L. Larkin, of the engineer's office at Mare Island was also aboard.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—The Palette and Chisel Club of Chicago has protested today to the park commissioners against sending the Diana, Nina and Santa Maria, reproductions of Christopher Columbus' caravels, to San Francisco as attractions at the 1915 fair. It was argued that the vessels were not strong enough to stand the trip. Charges are made that a money making scheme was behind the entire price.

Boston, Aug. 21.—The gunboat Nashville loaded ammunition at the Charleston navy yard and sailed under sealed orders for Mexico.
