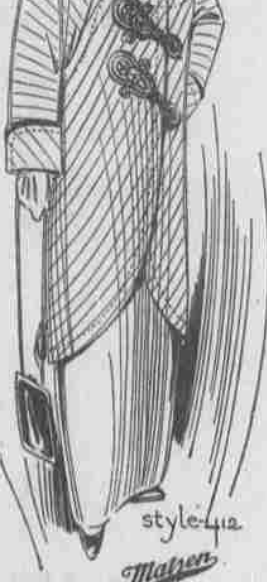

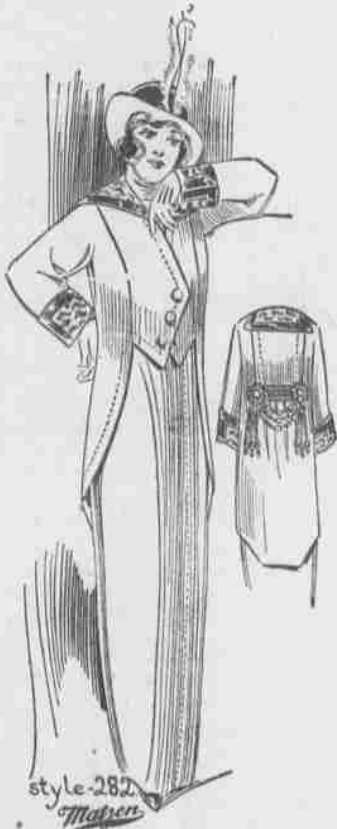

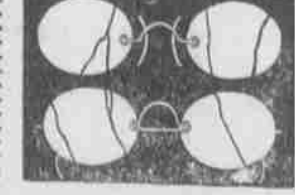
Capital City Brevities
