At the regular election held yesterday afternoon the sophomore class of Willamette University chose their new officers for the year. James Reid Bain, of Tillamook, was elected President. He has been a very active member of the class, and was the author of the freshman song which received the highest markings in the Freshman Glee club last year. Other officers chosen were vice-president, Helen Westell; secretary, Charles Ohlring; treasurer, Henry Richter, class reporter, Walter Gieseer, sergeant-at-arms, Inez Goltz.

Among other things "dolled up" for the state fair are the Waite fountain, which is getting a new shirt waist and the Breyman fountain, which is getting a new gown throughout, a rich bronze, that adds much to its appearance. Business houses are also getting full dress suits for the occasion, and many private residences are being prettily decorated.

According to City Superintendent of Schools Kuntz, he has registered 600 pupils for the high school this afternoon. This is a record that the Salem high school officials can be proud of, as it means 134 more this year than last.

It is a busy place at the fair grounds and the way things are being rushed into shape for the opening is something to astonish one. It will be the greatest fair ever held in the state, and that is saying much.

An effort is being made by the Oregon Anti-Saloon League to put Staron dry, an initiative local option petition being presented to County Clerk Gehlar today by the Anti-Saloon League. The petition calls for an election to be held on the wet and dry question on November 4, 1913, and it contains 80 names.

**FLAX BOOSTERS HOLD MEETING AT CLUB**

For the purpose of boosting the flax industry in Salem, several persons met in the office of August Schreiber last night and the following Salem boosters joined hands in forwarding the industry: T. H. Kay, Paul Wallace, Eugene Boese, Mrs. William Lord, Hal D. Patton, Theo. Roth, August Schreiber, and Hans McKeown.

The flax expert from Portland, Hans McKeown, gave some interesting information in regard to the growing of flax and its uses. He had with him several exhibits of material produced from flax and he stated that with the proper care and attention, Oregon could be made an ideal flax-growing section.

It will require at least \$150,000 to establish a plant in this city, according to the expert, and not less than sixty persons can easily be employed in the same.

With the above mentioned people pledged to work in the interest of the proposed new industry, Salem' payroll will be increased materially within a comparatively short time, it is believed, and the Marion county farmer will also be privileged to take up another branch in his work of producing.

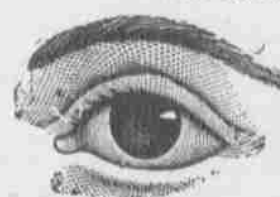
