> ON THE "ACCREDITED" LIST OF THE U. S. SCHOOLS

Approximately one-third of the 14,000 secondary schools in the United States are on a list of accredited schools just issued by the United States Bureau of Education. The list, which was com-piled by Dr. Kendric C. Babcock, form-erly of the Bureau of Education, now Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at other states to advanced high-school standing or to college, but incidentally reveals the marked improvement that has recently taken place in secondary education in the United States.

The Burean list has been made up chiefly from the various certification lists maintained by the states, but where the state officials print lists of high schools of different grades, only the schools of first rank are included. The general principles of selection are that the school shall offer the 14 or 15 points, accessary for admission to a standard college or university each point representing a subject studied for a year; that the curriculum represents 4 years of 36 or more weeks each; that

in italies to distinguish them from the others. Great care has been taken to see that the names and addresses are accurate, but warning is given that "lists such as these are bound to be out of date in a short time, and erewith caution." In some states creden-tials issued before 1910 require special scrutiny according to Dr. Babcock since high school development in those states is a matter of the past two or three

years.

The need for a list of accredited secondary schools has become especially evident in the frequent movements of families for residence from one part of the country to another. A thousand miles counts for little newadays, say the Gureau officials. The principal of the Los Angeles high school of the registration officers of the University of Chicago are likely at any time to have to pass on the standards and standing of secondary schools in Malden, Mass., Sumpter, S. C., San Antonio, Texas, or Billings, Mont. There are rapid changes in high schools, and widely varying types of schools, from the extreme classical to the extreme vocational. Hence the desirability of a national list that is a compilation of the state or sectional lists.


