Minto and Sam Burkhardt as deputies, two of the most experienced criminal detectives in the state and they are working on the streets both day and night. The sheriff is also out after the lawless class that generally follow the fair circuit and the county jail is already holding five suspects who have attempted to operate.

An auto driver this morning showed himself to be an expert at the trade by averting what would have resulted in a bad collision at the intersection of State and Liberty streets. Another machine was traveling south on Liberty while the handy driver was proceeding east on State. The machine going south shot out from behind a Cheveketa street car and failed to observe the other auto approaching. The automobile running on State was steered into the curb with such force that it mounted the sidewalk with the front wheels and stopped, while the other machine swerved to the left on two wheels and came to a stop within a few inches of another car standing on the corner. Both autos are from Portland. No damage was done, due to the quickness of the driver who ran on to the sidewalk.

Kills Self and Babe in Despair

Seattle Woman Leaves Note Saying She Is Failure, and It Is Known She Feared Insanity.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 2.—Fear that she was going insane drove Mrs. Hilda Strahre, aged 39, to kill herself and her 4-months-old baby with poison. The woman was the wife of Lieutenant S. T. Strahre, of the Seattle fire department. When Strahre returned home last night he found his wife in convulsions and the baby dead. The woman died before a doctor could be summoned.

"I was so slow," the woman wrote in a note found in the house, "it got on my nerves. I'm a wreck, but I cannot help it. I can't do right by husband and the children. I can't cook or anything else. My husband is a good man and has been helpful to me, but I am a failure. God help him to cheer up."

REPORTS OF FIXING JURORS ARE CURRENT

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 2.—When the Salzer impeachment trial was resumed today a report was current that several persons would be on hand to deny having "approached" certain senators included in the court's membership. The rumors were vague but plainly related to an alleged attempt to "fix" the verdict one way or the other, and it was thought possible sensational incidents might result.

PUBLICATION DECLARED LIBELOUS BY COURT

The grand jury considering several cases this afternoon made a presentment to Judge Kelly inquiring as to the nature of criminal libel. They wanted to know if the publication of an article in the way of an affidavit would be libel if the newspaper owner did not vouch for it. Judge Kelly said it would be libel and such an indictment must be found. This means that J. E. Hosmer, of the Silverton Journal, will be indicted for libeling the Mt. Angel convent.

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 2.—Further clashes between the Havenscourt interests and the Southern Pacific at Havenscourt, a suburb, were averted today when a conference was held between General Manager Calvin, for the Southern Pacific, and Attorney Mc C. Chapman and Walter Leimert, representing the Havens interest. It is believed that the dispute will be settled amicably.
