

GOSPEL BOAT WILL AGAIN SAVE SINNERS

Cleveland, O., Oct. 13.—The good ship Gospel Boat, piloted through the water front section and the residential district, and from which Chaplain J. D. Jones, former sailor and civil war veteran, will fish for the souls of men, is expected once more to become a familiar sight to Clevelanders. And John D. Rockefeller may be her sponsor.

The Gospel Boat was launched twelve years ago by Chaplain Jones as the Floating Bethel Mission. She is an eighteen foot yawl mounted on wheels and drawn by a team of horses. She made port wherever a crowd could be gathered. Within her cockpit stood an altar, a pile of hymn books and a melodeon. At her port and starboard bows hung the regulation red and green lights. At her stern floated the Stars and Stripes.

A few years ago the failing health of Chaplain Jones forced him to turn the helm over to Rev. Henry Hager, then pastor of the Euclid Avenue Baptist church, better known as John D. Rockefeller's church. It is through the rector of the Euclid Avenue house of worship that Rockefeller received much of his benefactions. A short time later the boat was "dry-docked" in a barn and has lain there ever since. But now her original pilot has come back. A few days ago he attended services at the Euclid Avenue Baptist church and spoke to the Oil King and the pastor, Rev. W. W. Bustard, concerning placing the boat again in commission. It is said Rockefeller heartily agreed to aid in the re-launching.

REV. BABOCK GOES TO CALIFORNIA DECEMBER 1

Accepting an offer to take the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church at Merced, Cal., Rev. H. T. Babcock, pastor of the local Presbyterian institution, will leave for the California city on the first of next December. The community in which Rev. Babcock expects to take up his new duties is inhabited by over 5000 people and the church is planning to erect a \$50,000 building within a short time. The well known minister will be greatly missed by his friends and acquaintances of this city, as he has been a very active worker in the interests of his church and other denominations. Resolutions of appreciation have been passed by different religious organizations in the city, lauding the departing minister for his good work here.

NORWEGIAN SCOFFS AT OUR PALACE COACHES

KILLS PAIR AND SELF.

TIM WOODRUFF DEAD AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

New York, Oct. 13.—Timothy L. Woodruff, former lieutenant-governor of New York state, died at 9:15 o'clock last night. He had lain in a critical condition for nearly two weeks after having been stricken with paralysis while addressing a fusion party rally in this city. He was 55 years old.

The former lieutenant-governor was first stricken on the night of September 29, last on the platform in Cooper Union at a fusion ratification meeting while making a stirring speech.

Born in New Haven, Conn., 55 years ago and a graduate from Yale university in the class of 1879, Mr. Woodruff shortly after began to take an active part in politics as a Republican. He was an active political figure in New York state for nearly 30 years, and until a year ago, when he left that party and joined the Progressives, his name was nearly always to be found in the roll of Republican, national, state and city conventions.

As a delegate from New York in the Republican national convention of 1908 he nominated James S. Sherman for vice-president. He ran for lieutenant-governor in 1896, was elected and re-nominated in 1898 and again in 1900.

CASES OF GUNMEN ARE ARGUED BEFORE COURT

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 13.—Arguments on the appeal of ex-Police Lieutenant Charles Becker and his four Rosenthal gunmen from sentence of death, were begun today before the court of appeals. The arguments were to have been made some weeks ago but the Sulzer impeachment proceedings at which the court of appeals judges sat as members of the impeachment court, made necessary the postponement until today. Speedy decisions in the Becker-gunmen cases are expected. Should the court decide against the condemned men it seemed certain today that a further appeal would be taken to the United States supreme court. This would mean that the men convicted of the sensational killing of Gambler Rosenthal will not be executed for many months at least.

BATHING FOR GIRLS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF SALEM

Editor Capital Journal:
I read in your paper the other night that the city school physician has recommended a shower bath system for girls installed in the high school for the betterment of the coming generations.

Of course, he is a doctor and speaks whereof he knows—probably—but what are the mothers of our country doing, and what are they going to do in the future about raising their families? Are we going to commence with the kindergarten and install apparatus in our public schools covering all the details of the home, such as washing dishes, making beds, darning stockings, frying chicken and keeping house generally? I don't mean to be a pessimist or a knocker, and would say that that the best is none too good, especially for our young girls, whom the doctor says are coming into womanhood—but it occurs to me that personal cleanliness and bathing are home duties, and should be attended to there.

Physiology teaches the necessity of bathing, of sunshine and of exercise, and it is taught in the public schools. If we were out of debt and had money to burn it might be wise to equip our schools and create more offices and hire more instructors to teach the rising generation things they should learn at their homes and remove all responsibilities of their parents, but with our half million-dollar indebtedness, and taxes going out of sight, I think it is high time to cut out a whole lot of this unnecessary expense.

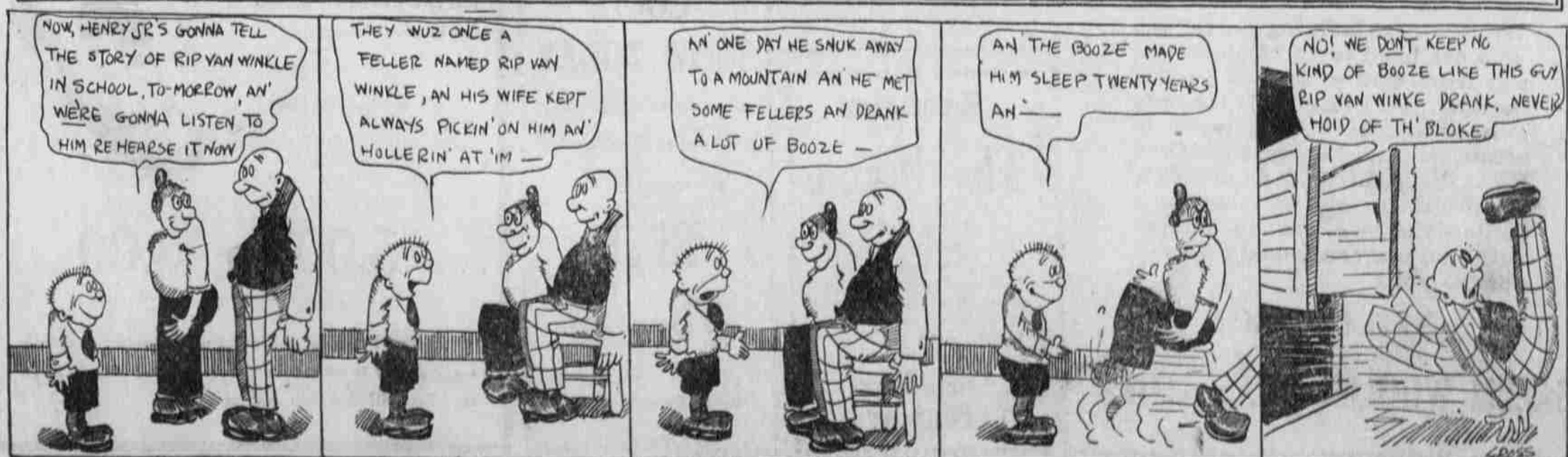
