HUERTA ANNOUNCES HE IS NOW DICTATOR

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE]
Mexico City, Oct. 13.—Provisional President Huerta issued today a decree to the effect that he has assumed all

powers hitherto vested in the Mexican congress, suspended by him last week. Military, financial and domestic affairs, he said, he would handle himself, but the department of justice will be allowed to continue in authority so long as it interferes with none of his decrees.

He suspended the constitution, insofar as it exempts members of congress from arrest, and declared himself the

supreme power in the country. The decree amounted to the declaration of a dictatorship, modified only by a promise that Huerta will render an account of his actions to the government to be elected October 26.

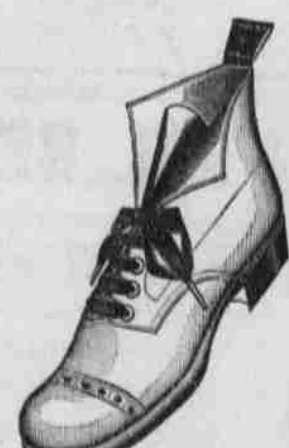
