Judge Kelly, of the Marion county court, is today hearing the case of Ursula Yokulis against the Silverton Lumber Co. The plaintiff in this action is seeking to recover \$25,000 damages on the grounds he was injured as the result of the defendant's negligence in providing safeguards around its mill machinery in Silverton.
James Nueman, of Cottage Grove, is in the city looking after business matters today. Mr. Nueman is a leading stock raiser in southern Oregon and took away several blue ribbons at the state fair this year with his fine herd of cattle. He likes Salem and, providing he can find suitable grazing grounds, will make this place his headquarters for his prize stock. The visitor owns over 700 head of fine cattle, not counting many head of high bred horses and hogs.

AVIATOR WHO BREAKS RECORD PROSTRATED

Mulhausen, Germany, Oct. 15.—Aviator Victor Stoeffler, who, at 12:42 a. m. yesterday, descended here after beating the world's record for a 24-hour flight, was still prostrated with exhaustion today. Though actually in the air while covering 1376 miles, only 22 hours and 47 minutes, his stops were so brief that his feat amounted practically to a continuous flight, and so long a continuation of such an intense strain as an aviator is subject to, his doctors said, was almost more than flesh and blood could endure.
In a 100 horse power biplane Stoeffler flew from Johannisthal to Posen and back, then to Mulhausen, and subsequently four times back and forth between Mulhausen and Damsadt.
