HEAD OF SALVATION ARMY ARRIVES IN AMERICA TO INSPECT WORK

New York, Oct. 31.—Bramwell Booth, successor to his father, the late General William Booth, as head of the Salvation Army, arrived here today from London on the liner Lusitania. He occupied two rooms of the liner's "regal suite."
Booth paid a strong tribute to the work of the Salvation Army, asserting that his father was ahead of his time in teaching equality of sexes. This is Booth's first visit to America, and he will remain here only three weeks. The object of his trip, he said, was to inspect the army's work in America, but he flatly refused to discuss a report that he plans to collect a huge fund here.
Booth announced his intention of visiting his brother, Ballington Booth, head of the Volunteers of America, but said this must not be taken as meaning that a union of the two organizations was contemplated.

REGULAR PLAYERS WILL BE USED BY BIG TEAMS

New York, Oct. 31.—Football games scheduled for tomorrow throughout the east were not expected to affect the championship, but the coaches of the various colleges do not intend to take any chances, and regular players will be used. Ideal football weather was predicted for tomorrow by the weather bureau.
Two of Harvard's regular players will be out of tomorrow's game with Cornell on account of injuries. They are Hitchcock and Mahan. Cornell was not expected to make a very strong showing against the crimson, and it was not believed the two regulars would be missed. The practice of the Harvard squad today was confined to 20 minutes easy scrimmage, the coaches giving the men a let-up on account of the large number of minor injuries.
The Yale team engaged in its final scrimmage practice yesterday. The regulars put up an aggressive game, scoring five touchdowns on the scrubs.
Dartmouth and Amherst also meet tomorrow. The Dartmouth eleven, which recently defeated Princeton, 6 to 0, was in fine shape today and was a big favorite for Amherst.
Princeton will meet Holy Cross, and the Tiger coaches were confident of victory.

OPEN FORUM. KEHRBERGER COMES BACK AT THOSE WHO DISLIKE VIEWS

Editor Journal: Some folks are worrying about the German society and their stand on drinking beer. Of course, there are some Germans and many others that are so lacking in self-control that they can't trust themselves to live when orderly, well-regulated saloons are licensed. They evidently don't believe in man's being a free moral agent. They haven't the backbone necessary to stamp them as people of high moral character. The German loves his beer, as our society has said, but he prizes, above all, the freedom to exercise his choice to take or leave. If man were not flesh, and if all temptation could be removed this world would contain no more angels than it now has. Restriction breeds hypocrisy.
We believe the question is not "whiskey or no whiskey," but rather the well-regulated control of the liquor traffic in an orderly manner, as opposed to irregular secret sale by irresponsible parties. We detect the hypocrisy which blinds itself into believing that writing a law not fully backed by public opinion into the statute books will better this world.
Whence comes the universal contempt of law in this country? The Germans prize themselves on their patriotism, on the fact that they are in a high degree a law-abiding people. We duly apologize to the Dutch Yankees who have swapped their sturdiness of character for a spineless hypocrisy that won't permit them to trust themselves alone in the dark with a jug of liquor. We claim that the freedom to exercise choice is what builds up a character, even though it errs at times.

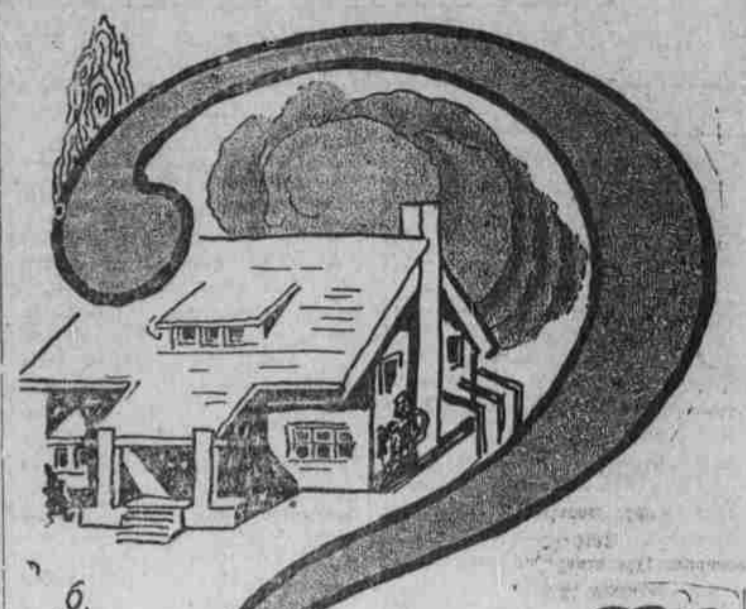
