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WORLD-WIDE PEACE ONLY A DREAM.

**M**R. CARNEGIE and Mr. Bryan are both acute advocates of peace. To bring about this greatly to be desired condition, Mr. Carnegie is putting up some of his ill-gotten money and Mr. Bryan is putting up some rather strong and to himself convincing arguments. The latter sound good and the former look all right. How will they work in practice and to whom is this world-wide peace to be given? England, Germany, Russia, France, Italy, Austria and the United States. Add to these those smaller governments that are already established, that are now recognized by the big powers, and that would be the end of the peace movement. No others need apply. What would be the status of those countries yet under the heel of the foreigner? What of China, that through much blood and trouble must work out her own destiny?

What of India, with its 400,000,000 people now under the thumb of Great Britain? Will there be peace for them? Will it be a peace maintained by the combined powers, in which India is kept from that God-given right to govern herself? Will India forever consent to this condition remaining? The world powers would proclaim peace on earth and would maintain it with their armies. Would this be a peace with honor for China? Would England loosen her grasp on India before this world's peace dream is pronounced true? Would France free Morocco? Would Poland be given the liberty for which she has fought so nobly though she has fought in vain, before this peace compact is sealed? Would Japan restore to Korea the liberties of which she so cruelly deprived her, before she, too, became a party to this universal peace measure?

Are the countless millions of Africa now apportioned to "zones of influence" among the powers of Europe to be made parties to this world peace compact in which they are kept in a state of vassalage?

Are the billion of people in India and China expected to remain vassals and subject to the white man's domination when this universal peace business materializes? The white race has been supreme, perhaps will be in a measure always be supreme, but it is as certain as that night follows day, that the nations of the earth are not to submit forever to this domination. There is too much rapacity, too much injustice in it, and sooner or later it must be remedied.

There can be no universal peace until there is universal liberty. A world's peace declared now would mean a peace with conditions remaining as they are now. It would mean a world's peace with the minority in the saddle. It would mean a world's peace with the majority of the people of the world in a state of subjection. We, a half century ago here in America, demonstrated that there could be no peace with slavery. We proved that we could not get along part free and part slave. Suppose that this world peace movement had been in effect before our civil war, would it have meant that the slave once a slave must be a slave forever? Would the other parties to the universal peace pact have gone to the aid of the south and insisted that in the interest of universal peace there should be no freeing of the slaves? Would this peace pact have stopped the war, and if so, would it have been for the betterment of humanity, or otherwise?

It is easy for the white man to get the idea that he was born to rule the world, and others were born to be ruled by him. Those others are, however, apt to take a different view of it. True, Mr. Carnegie would provide the court at The Hague. This sounds nice, but who would have a right to appear at that court? The parties to the agreement and so others. Could India go there with a complaint against England? Could the Philippines appear before it with a demand for freedom from the rule of the United States? Could any of the downtrodden of the world make appeal to it and have its appeal heard or acted on? A world's peace declared now would mean a peace with a continued state of subjugation for all now under foreign domination. It would mean the maintaining of the status quo, that conditions could not change, and that whatever hardships any of the subjugated ones bore at the time of the promulgation of the world's peace agreement, these they would have to bear indefinitely.

There can be no world's peace until with it goes world-wide freedom. All the world is not yet ready for self-government and until it is there can be no universal peace. Every of the subjugated nations must win its liberties as liberty has always been won, amid the surging of doubtful and desperate battle. There is no primrose path to the shrine of liberty. The African and the Asiatic must win their way, not by world's peace, which would keep them forever slaves, but by the survival of the fittest when they have fought the fight and the conflict is over.

When the ruling nations are ready to do equal and exact justice to dependent nations, to give them the fullest measure of freedom, the dawn of peace on earth will break. When the principle of independence is acknowledged by the powers of the earth as the right of each of its peoples or nations, when absolute justice reigns universally, when all the people of the earth are capable of self-government, when injustice and wrong are no more, when cruelty and greed have vanished, when the so-called Christian nations cease to forget the teachings of Christ, when they learn and obey the golden rule, when they do unto others as they would that others should do unto them, then, and not until then, can there be a world-wide peace.

With conditions as they are, does it strike you that the time is at hand? There will be world peace when there is world-wide justice and universal freedom, and not until then. This means it will not materialize during Mr. Carnegie's time on earth, and that it is only in the remote future that it can even be hoped for by the most optimistic of humanitarians.

### A NEW LABOR LAW IN OREGON.

**T**HE FARGO, N. D., COURIER-NEWS thus comments on the Oregon labor laws concerning women:

"The Industrial Welfare Commission of Oregon has made a ruling which has the status of law beginning November 23, fixing a minimum wage of \$5.25 per week for adult women clerks who are not apprentices; defining eight hours and twenty minutes as a maximum day and fifty hours as a maximum week's work, and establishing 6 o'clock p. m., as the latest

hour at which any woman may be employed in a mercantile establishment any day in the year.

This will eliminate Saturday night shopping in stores which employ women clerks, and will stop the late shopping of Christmas season. Most of the department stores resisted the proposed ruling.

It will be interesting to watch the outcome of this experiment. The whole question of women's employment in mercantile and factory labor needs a thorough overhauling. It is resulting in the serious depletion of the vitality of the children born of women whose strength has been sapped in such occupations.

A woman's body was not made to bear the burdens of the commercial or the manufacturing world. It will be better for all concerned when most of this is abolished—if it can be.

Considering how easily and satisfactorily the Oregonian editorial staff could handle the Mexican situation, it would be the part of wisdom for President Wilson to turn the job over to it. There are hundreds of young Oregonians who would like to serve in the same regiments as the Oregonian editors when war with Mexico is once started.

Massachusetts is now as progressive as Kansas, and has evidently broken away from her long time Republican leading strings.

W. H. Palmer, a pioneer of 1856, died at his home in Benton county last Saturday. He was 77 years old.

An Ashland farmer has just sold his crop of onions, getting \$450 an acre for them. The yield was 300 sacks to the acre, and the price was \$1.50 per sack.
