When he pointed out that for thirteen years the World's Purity federation has been steadily at work combatting the white slave traffic, the social evil, and kindred evils, without the accompaniment of "sensationalism, notoriety-seeking or hysterical methods." The federation, he explained, has been seeking for years to put before the public, statistics and cold figures on vice and the social evil, not merely to declaim against such things "but to set right minded people to thinking how best to remove the evils which exist, prudes, white slavers, corrupt politicians, and

over-sensitive persons to the contrary." Special stress was laid on the importance of publicity in spreading the knowledge of these conditions "no matter how much it hurts the sensibilities of some, and despite violent opposition from certain organizations and cliques" in order to arouse the public to full realization of the necessity for demanding government aid in reform. Some of the prominent speakers scheduled are Congressman Richmond Pearson Hobson, Alabama; Stanley W. Finch, special United States commissioner of the Department of Justice to suppress white slavery; United States Senator William S. Kenyon, of Iowa; Catherine Booth Chubborn, daughter of the late Gen. Booth, England; Dr. Keshava Deva Shastri, of India; Mrs. E. F. Carroll, president of the Iowa National congress of Mothers; Barrett O'Hara, Lieut. Gov. of Illinois; Rev. J. N. McCormick, Bishop of Western Michigan; Rab-

bi Rudolph Coffey, Pittsburg, Pa.; Dr. Emma F. A. Drake, Denver; Prof. T. W. Shannon, Marietta, Ohio; Kate Waller Barrett, of Washington, D. C.; Miss Kate Davis, of Wilkesbarre, Pa. and Dr. E. C. Jenkins, Omaha.
