Portland, Ore., Nov. 21.—How alleged "frame-ups" were worked by certain members of the police department in their attempts to "get" others were described by witness before the municipal civil service board which began an open investigation yesterday of charges that members of the department had protected criminals, gambled and indulged in other irregularities.
