In football they plan to play three conference teams here next season. In basketball they will play Oregon and O. A. C. here but it is not probable that many of the other conference teams will be brought for the first season unless basket ball should prove to be a much better paying proposition than it ever has in the past.

In baseball it is quite probable that Willamette will be able to play all the teams in this conference division and should she win out as champion of this division, consisting of University of Oregon, University of Washington and Oregon Agricultural College, the game for the championship of the conference will be enough of a drawing card to pay for itself either in Salem or at some neutral point.

While Willamette has not held any track meets with conference schools for the past few years, she now proposes to place herself on the map in this branch of athletics also and beginning next season will participate in one or two big conference track meets.

Prior to the meeting at which the students voted to enter the conference yesterday morning Dean Patterson stated to them that the faculty advised that they be very deliberate in their proceedings, as the board of trustees were not in favor of intercollegiate athletics.

In speaking of the matter before the student body several prominent students voiced the opinion that if the members of the board of trustees were sure that the large majority of the students and the alumni of the institution were strongly in favor of entering the conference and raising the athletic standards of the institution, even higher than they have been in the past, that their opinions would have considerable weight and that any personal objection which the individual members of the board of trustees might have would be overlooked.

The faculty members have not reversed their ruling on the Sunday traveling question and the indications are that they do not intend to, but in spite of the conference seemed to hinge, was "will entering the conference increase the financial obligations of the school?" There were many answers to this question, the generally accepted solution being that, while it will cost more to bring the teams to the city that Willamette will play after she has entered the conference, yet they will be of so much higher standard that have been played here in the past that the attracting power will be much greater and it is quite probable that increased seating capacity will be needed to accommodate the crowds that will come out to football and baseball games against teams like University of Washington and Washington State College.

While the students did not seem to feel that they could yet afford to take on every conference team that might come through, yet they will play just as many conference games as possible.

WILLAMETTE ENTERS CONFERENCE AT LAST

University Takes Its Place With Big Ones and Will Have Strong Teams on Athletic List.

SOME DIFFICULTIES TO BE OVERCOME BY STUDENTS

One Handicap Is Ruling of University Faculty Against Teams Doing Any Sunday Traveling.

Willamette University voted yesterday by an overwhelming majority to make application for entrance to the Northwest Conference when the conference managers meet at Portland a week from Saturday. There were only 13 opposing votes.

The "W" Club and the Alumni Association have been advocating the move for the past two years, and this year a vigorous campaign was instituted under the direction of the "W" Club.

Following the announcement of the result, Errol Gilkey, president of the student body, gave out the statement that the executive committee had chosen Dr. Sweetland from the faculty, and Paul Homan from the student body to make application for admittance to the conference and represent Willamette at the meeting in Portland a week from Saturday.
