TWENTY-SEVEN PERSONS ARE BURNED TO DEATH

PERISH WHEN LODGING HOUSE IN BOSTON IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Building Is Five-Story Fifteen-Cent Hotel and Worst Type of Firetrap--Burns Like Tinder and Those Who Escape Are Driven Into Street Almost or Quite Naked--Only One of Victims Is Identified--One Hundred and Seventy-Five Asleep in Building When Fire Starts--Rigid Investigation Ordered.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Boston, Mass., Dec. 3.—Twenty-seven persons perished in a fire which destroyed the Aradia, a Washington street lodging house, early today. Three others were fatally burned, according to the doctors. The building, a five-story 15-cent hotel, was the worst type of fire trap. It burned like tinder and those of its occupants, all men, who escaped, were driven into the street almost or quite naked, so fiercely did the flames pursue them. The only victim identified was George Adams of South Boston, the others being burned beyond recognition. Escape Is Cut Off. One hundred and seventy-three men were asleep in the lodging house when the fire started. Leaping upward from a lower hall, the flames cut off escape from the upper floors by the stairway. The only fire escape was at the rear,

and the fire spread so rapidly that not many of the lodgers could reach it. The second floor of the building was devoted mainly to offices, on the third were small sleeping rooms furnished with cots, on the fourth were smaller rooms, and on the fifth, where most of the fatalities occurred, was a dormitory lined with tiers of bunks. Mayor Fitzgerald promised a rigid investigation to fix responsibility for the tragedy. Thin Wooden Partitions. A casual preliminary examination showed that the building had been remodelled recently, the masonry walls having been removed to make more room and thin wooden partitions substituted. These partitions did not even reach to the ceilings, so that the flames had free draft on each floor. Medical Examiner Leary was to confer with District Attorney Pelletier concerning the case this afternoon.

LANE SAYS AIM IS TO BENEFIT ALL INSTEAD OF FAVORED FEW

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Washington, Dec. 3.—Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane addressed the rivers and harbors congress today instead of President Wilson, who is confined to the White House with a slight cold. "The government's policy," said Lane, "is for the control of river and harbor development for all, instead of a favored few." In a letter expressing regret over his inability to attend today's meeting, President Wilson predicted the early harmonizing of all interests, "upon a comparative and concerted plan, which would benefit the whole country." Indications this afternoon were that a hot fight on the question of states' rights was certain.

WARRANT IS ISSUED FOR MRS. PANKHURST'S ARREST

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] London, Dec. 3.—The home office this afternoon issued a warrant for the arrest of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, who is scheduled to arrive at Plymouth tomorrow from a trip to the United States. The police were authorized to arrest her upon her arrival, and to enter her cabin by force, if necessary. WELCH SOME BETTER. [UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Seattle, Wash., Dec. 3.—Patrick Welch, the Spokane railroad contractor, who was operated upon in Seattle last week, and whose recovery was despaired of, showed slight signs of improvement this morning, and his physicians say he may survive.

Many Persons Hurt in Strike Fights and Many Arrested

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 3.—More fighting marked the teamsters' strike here today. Several policemen, special deputies and strikebreakers were hurt by missiles thrown by strike sympathizers. Dozens of strikers suffered from broken heads, inflicted by policemen's clubs. There was a little gun fighting, too, Samuel Rutledge, a striker, was shot in the leg by a strikebreaker, and taken to a hospital. Numerous arrests were made. Despite all the preparations the employers had made to prevent a tie-up by the strike, teaming was badly crippled. Manufacturers were canceling orders for perishable goods, and some factories were forced to shut down, owing to lack of fuel. Organizer Thomas Farrell, of the teamsters' union, received a request

from the local hospitals for permission to move food for their patients. It was expected he would grant it. Employers of 600 of the strikers offered to sign an agreement with the union, but Organizer Farrell refused the offer, saying he would consider no proposition which did not provide work for at least 1500 men. The union includes 3000 members, all of whom were out. In addition to the teamsters, 3000 more workers were temporarily idle, because the strike had indirectly tied up industries employing them. SMOKE AND FOG LIFTS. [UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Chicago, Dec. 3.—The fog and smoke which had kept the city in semi-darkness for nearly eight days lifted this morning, and the sun shone for the first time in 180 hours.

OREGON HAS NO FISH OR GAME WARDENS AS RESULT OF BIG ROW

Governor Says Finley and Clanton Are Both Out of Jobs Today.

APPOINTMENTS HELD UP West Says He Will Wait Until Little Coterie of Malcontents Get Through Kicking.

Oregon has no fish or game wardens now. A short time ago all the members of the fish and game commission except Mr. Kinney tendered their resignations, and these were accepted by Governor West Monday. The commission's going out of business necessarily removes the wardens, as they are simply the executive officers of the commission, though they had overlooked that fact and had assumed they were the whole thing. Warden Finley, who has charge of the game was notified today of his legal demise and Mr. Clanton is already aware that he is defunct. The governor said this morning that no appointments would be made until the disgruntled little coterie of malcontents get through kicking, and that until that time the fish and game would have to get along as best they could. Law Not Complied With. The law provides that the headquarters of the commission should be maintained here, should have a paid secretary, through whom all business of the office should be conducted. This has not been done, and the fish and game wardens have each built up a little department of their own in which they were the whole thing. It was "the fish warden did this or ordered that, or the game warden did it," and the commission was ignored. There was also a clash of authority between the two, and a mixture of business that was very unbusiness-like. For instance, the fish warden attended to hatching the trout and game fish along with the salmon, and after they were hatched, he turned them over to the game warden. He acted as incubator and the game warden as brooder. Praises Commission. The governor speaks in the highest terms of the fish commissioners who have resigned, saying they had given both time and money in conducting the office for which there is no salary, and he regrets to see them quit, but cannot blame them, as the position was rewarded with kicks and complaints—and nothing else. As soon as the atmosphere clears the governor will appoint a new commission that will have a secretary and the business of the commission will be conducted by it instead of by the wardens who are only its officers to enforce the laws under its direction. The women can wear pleasant feathers for a little while at least, without the fear of having them taken away from them, and the pheasants can also wear them undisturbed by ubiquitous deputies. The deputies of course, go out of office along with their bosses, the wardens. It is quite certain that there will be a new deal all around, and that the names of the new appointees will not be identical with those now holding the positions, or who have just ceased holding them. GOVERNMENT DAM ACT IS CALLED IMPOSSIBLE [UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Washington, Dec. 3.—Consideration of the problem of river improvement and construction of navigation dams and locks was demanded by Ross Brown, of Minneapolis, in his address before the rivers and harbors convention today. "These problems," he said "may be solved only on a basis of assistance and cooperation of private capital and the government and concessions sufficiently liberal to attract private investment." Brown characterized the government dam act as "impossible."

Late News Bulletins

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Marshfield, Ore., Dec. 3.—Officers of the State Bank at Myrtle Point, which was robbed several days ago, today offered \$1000 reward for the arrest and conviction of the robbers, and 25 per cent of the money recovered. The amount stolen has been fixed at about \$10,000.

Aberdeen, Wash., Dec. 3.—Returning from the scene of the wreck today, Captain John E. Anderson, of the stranded schooner Balbon, stated that there was no hope of saving the vessel, as its stern had split and its rudder had been washed away. A heavy sea is washing over the schooner through the gap made in the falsework of the north jetty by the recent storm.

Marshfield, Ore., Dec. 3.—F. E. Allen was elected mayor of Marshfield by a majority of nearly 200 over Carl Albert, according to almost complete reports today. John Butler was re-elected city recorder.

DR. KNABE MURDERED IS TESTIMONY GIVEN BY CORONER IN CASE

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Shelbyville, Ind., Dec. 3.—Coroner Durham, of Marion county, dealt a body blow today at the theory of the defense in the case of Dr. William Craig, on trial here, charged with murdering Dr. Helen Knabe, of Indianapolis, that the woman physician died by her own hand. He was early at the scene of the tragedy, following the discovery of Dr. Knabe's body in her Indianapolis apartment with her throat cut. It would have been physically impossible, he told the jury from the witness stand, for the woman to have inflicted such a wound on herself. Moreover, he continued, the victim's head was wedged so tightly between the bars at the head of the bed that it was only with great difficulty that it could be disengaged. She could not have forced it into such a position herself, even if she had wished, he said.

BELIEVES 425,000 ARE SUBJECT TO INCOME TAX PROVISION

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Washington, Dec. 3.—The report of Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo was presented to congress today. It discussed currency legislation and business unrest, and recited the offers of the government to loan money to banks to move crops. The report declared that \$46,000,000 was apportioned to the various states. The report said it was impossible to estimate the revenue to be derived from the new tariff bill. It said that 425,000 persons were subject to the income tax provisions. The report also recommended the enlargement of the public health service, the building of four revenue cutters and the consolidation of the revenue cutter and life saving bureaus into a single organization.

CALIFORNIA BANK IS ROBBED AND CASHIER SHOT BY TWO BANDITS

Pair Hurry Away With \$20,000 Secured in Raid and Posses Search.

EYE-WITNESS OF CRIME

Resident of Blythe Tells How They Draged Banker to Door and Shot Him in Neck.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Imperial Junction, Cal., Dec. 3.—The Bank of Blythe was robbed of \$20,000 yesterday by two bandits, who shot the cashier. Posses are now engaged in an extensive man-hunt and it is believed the robbers will be captured. Owing to the fact that Blythe is isolated the news was slow to reach out side points. Frank Murphy, a resident of Blythe, who reached here today en route to Los Angeles, told the following story of the robbery: Tells of Robbery. "I was standing across the street from the bank about closing time. Two men, mounted on cow ponies, rode up to the bank and entered together. There was some wrangling inside, and then the pair reappeared, each with a money bag under his arm. Bowles had his arm about one man, and was being dragged out of the door, when the other turned and shot him through the neck. "We organized a posse and pursued the men to the mesquite brush along the Colorado river, where we lost them. Then we sent a messenger to the railroad with the news." Posses Are Busy. It was shortly after noon that Deputy Sheriff Sheehan and his posse were working down the west bank of the Colorado river, while a second posse is keeping pace with them on the Arizona side. Sheriff Meadows, of Imperial county, is working northward on the west bank, while the sheriff of Yuma county, Arizona, with 20 deputies, is hurrying northward from Yuma to the Arizona side. Unless the men had a boat hidden near Blythe, and escaped past Yuma during the night, bound for the Mexican line, they probably will be caught between the advancing posses. All Trains Searched. Special Agent Andrew Prott, of the Southern Pacific railroad, caused all trains to be stopped here today and searched for the robbers. The railroad authorities issued similar orders to their agents at Yuma, Arizona. Blythe is 60 miles northeast of Imperial Junction. It has no outside telegraph or telephone connections. Word of the robbery and murder was carried to Glamis late yesterday by a cowboy, who rode from Blythe across the desert in less than six hours. Telegrams were sent from Glamis to Sheriff Wilson at Riverside. Practically the entire town of Blythe, the messenger said, has joined in the man hunt.

"DRY" SLEUTHS FACE BAN AS RESULT OF ORDINANCE

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Pendleton, Or., Dec. 3.—If an ordinance introduced at the last session of the council is adopted tomorrow night, it may play an important part toward blocking any future attempt to procure evidence in this city against violators of the liquor regulations. The ordinance makes it a misdemeanor for a patron to ask for a drink on Sunday, or after closing hours, and provides the same punishment as for the liquor dealer. Under these circumstances, it is said that persons being known would have no trouble in procuring drinks, while an outsider who asked for a drink would be liable to arrest for violation of the ordinance. While it is not openly charged, some are of the opinion that the ordinance was introduced to prevent agents of the governor or anybody else obtaining evidence upon which to prosecute liquor law violators.

COLOMBIA HOTLY DENOUNCES U. S.

Note Received by Mexican Congress in Which United States' Interference in Latin-American Affairs Is Resented and Mexico Is Urged to Resist--Some Favor an Immediate Reply But Secret Session Is Held and Decision Is Reached to Postpone Consideration of Message--Huerta Orders ex-President Diaz on Fighting List.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Mexico City, Dec. 3.—The Mexican congress today received a note from the government of Colombia hotly denouncing the United States' interference in Latin-American affairs, and urging Mexico to resist it. Several members of the senate favored an immediate reply, but President Huerta called a secret session instead, and the decision was reached to postpone consideration of the message. President Huerta today issued an order summarily placing ex-President Porfirio Diaz again on the active army list. He said he would follow this with a peremptory order for the institution of legal proceedings to bring the ex-president back to Mexico. It was agreed in official circles that Diaz could not refuse without placing himself in a most embarrassing position. The war office published a report of a battle two days ago 12 miles from the capital in which it was said the federals routed 200 Zapatistas, killing 10 and wounding 20 of them. Elimination Growing Near. The belief was growing here, however, that Huerta's elimination was near. Disapproval of his regime was spreading. Even congress, which he packed with his own supporters at the recent election, was turning against him. It was predicted that the lawmakers would speedily depose him, if he escaped assassination, and refuses to resign. One thing over which he did continue to exercise control was the local press. If the editors were disconcerted they could not very well say so secretly through the columns of their papers, and it was unsafe to manifest dissatisfaction with the Huerta regime openly. They published President Wilson's message to congress under huge headlines, it was true, but they asserted that the American chief executive did

not know Mexican conditions, and ought not to predict Huerta's downfall for that reason.

Seeks to Head Off Federals. El Paso, Tex., Dec. 3.—General Villa rushed rebel troops to the eastward from Juarez today in the hope of intercepting the federal garrison of Chihuahua City, fleeing to the border. He expected them to cross the river at Presidio Viejo and believed they wanted to be arrested on the American side for violating the neutrality laws, as preferable to falling into his hands. The entire seven federal generals who offered to surrender to him were believed to be with the fugitives. "And the only place where they'll surrender will be the United States," said Villa, patting his revolver significantly.

Tampico Is Capital. Mexico City, Dec. 3.—Tampico was officially declared today to be temporary federal capital of Tamaulipas state. Victoria, the regular capital, was captured by the rebels recently. May Seek Japan's Support. Paris, Dec. 3.—Francisco Do La Barrn left today for Japan, his ostensible mission being to lead a delegation sent to thank the Mikado for Japanese participation in the Mexican centennial celebration two years ago. There were rumors that his real object was to secure Japanese support for the Huerta regime, but they were unverifiable. Says Visit Harmful. Mexico City, Dec. 3.—Chargé d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy, of the American embassy today openly voiced his regret that Admiral Sir Christopher Cradock, English naval commander in Mexican waters, called on President Huerta yesterday. "I don't believe the call should have

Pension for Mothers is Working Well in Two Ohio Counties

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Dayton, O., Dec. 3.—Ohio's Mothers' pension law is working, but it's only working in Dayton and Montgomery county. Mothers of this city and all of Montgomery county are thanking Probate Judge Roland W. Baggott, for he's the man that made it possible for needy mothers to profit now, instead of waiting until February 1915, at which time Attorney General Hogan says the newly enacted Ohio Mothers' pension levies can be paid. Here is what Judge Baggott has ruled that property owners of Dayton and Montgomery county must do for the mothers: Every man who owns one thousand dollars worth of property must contribute ten cents a year.
