SALEM COFFEE CLUB SUBSCRIPTION OPENS

Those Favoring Plan to Provide Place for Men Have Raised \$210 So Far for Enterprise.

EUGENE MAN AGAIN TELLS HOW PLAN WORKS THERE

Confident That Place Where Working-men Can Be Comfortable and Enjoy Privileges Will Succeed.

With \$210 already on hand and good prospects ahead for at least \$2000 more, the Salem Coffee Club is now on its way to be organized permanently.

The workings of a coffee club are the simplest thing in the world, according to Professor DeCou, of Eugene. Professor DeCou started the meeting off with an address in which he gave a detailed description of the manner in which the city of Eugene conducts its coffee club.

Free Labor Bureau. One great feature of a coffee club, said Professor DeCou, is the free labor bureau. He said that the Eugene club secures work for eight and ten men a day and during the nine months the club has been in existence, over 8000 men have been found employment.

The coffee club is not a charitable institution, said the speaker, but one where the laboring man can go and eat and rest at a very nominal price. Professor DeCou advised the Salem people to raise at least \$2500 to equip and start the club on its way and within a short time the corporation would pay for itself, and then some.

It was finally decided by the meeting to capitalize the organization at \$9000 and to arrange for incorporation immediately.

About sixty people attended the meeting and every one was anxious that the club be started as soon as possible. The following is the subscription list of last night:

Next Championship Bout. The Willie Ritchie-Tommy Murphy contest, a genuine world's championship dispute, is the next thing to attract the attention of the followers of Queensberry sport. The lightweights will meet in Coffroth's Eight street arena on the night of December 10.

The principals are already in training. Ritchie being quartered at Millett's near Colma, while Murphy is in camp at Shannon's, San Rafael.

Betting on the lightweight championship has begun, quite a number of wagers of small dimensions being recorded. Ritchie was established favorite at odds of 10 to 8, and from the amount of Ritchie money seeking action the commissioners appear to think that the price against Murphy will lengthen to 10 to 7.

It remains to be seen, however, whether public opinion will continue in the same groove when the date of the match draws nearer.

The training of Ritchie and Murphy will be watched closely by hordes of sports and the work done at rival camps may be viewed in such a way as to cause a change of sentiment among the betting men.

At the start there is every reason for believing that the change in the weight scale has been looked upon as a big factor in Ritchie's favor and has resulted in the champion being installed a pronounced first choice.

Had the men boxed at 133 pounds, ringside, in accordance with the conditions which prevailed in the Ritchie-Wolganst match instead of at 135 pounds one hour before ringside, it is very probable that Ritchie and Murphy would have sold even in the early betting.
