A few extracts chosen from the book may give some idea of its spicy, pithy character. "When men know what they want they get it. Every wrong thing we have to face in modern industrial life is due to men who know what they want, and who therefore get it."

"The problem of living in this modern world is the problem of finding room in it." "The value of a piece of land is the number of foot steps passing by it in twenty-four hours. The value of a railroad is the number of people near it who can not keep still."

"Every idea we have is run into a constitution. We can not think without a chairman. Our whims have secretaries; our fads have bylaws. Literature is a club. Philosophy is a society. Our reforms are mass meetings."

"CROWDS." The public library has just added one of the season's new books which is worth reading. It is "Crowds: a Moving Picture of Democracy" by Gerald Stanley Lee. This is rather an unusual book and will be found entertaining. It is written in five parts: Crowds and machines; Letting the crowds be good; Letting the crowd be beautiful; Crowds and heroes; Good news and hard work; and the hangings of some of the chapters are where are we going; is it wrong for good people to be efficient; doing as one would wish one had done in twenty years; new kinds and new sizes of men; the inconvenience of being human.

Mr. Lee himself says of the book: "The book is not put forward as an attempt to arrange a world, or as a system or a chart, or as a nation machine, or even as an argument. The one thing that any one can fairly claim for this book is that one man's life has been
