

DARROW INDICTMENT AT LOS ANGELES IS DROPPED

 Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 20.—An indictment of a year's standing against Clarence S. Darrow, Chicago labor attorney, charging him with having bribed Robert Bain, a prospective juror in the McNamara trial, was dropped today at the instance of District Attorney Fredericks.

Fredericks appeared before Superior Judge Jackson and stated that, inasmuch as Darrow has been tried twice on bribery charges, the state was willing that the indictment be dismissed.

Darrow was tried and acquitted on a charge of bribing or attempting to bribe George Lockwood, a McNamara juror. Later he was tried on the Bain charge, but the jury disagreed.

Both indictments against Darrow grew out of Darrow's connection with the trial of the McNamara brothers, dynamiters of the Los Angeles Times building. Darrow was their chief counsel.

Senora Salazar and her son came here immediately following the Chihuahua fugitives' arrival at Ojinaga.

ASK \$500,000 TO TAKE CARE OF NEEDY IN LOS ANGELES

 Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 20.—Request for \$500,000 immediate relief of the unemployed here and for \$5,000,000 to be appropriated later, was made to the city council today in a resolution adopted last night at a mass meeting called by several civic organizations.

The resolution was referred by the council to its finance committee. The delegation was invited to name a representative to confer with this body.

Spokesmen for the delegation told the council that if Chief of Police Sebastian's estimate that 3,000 persons in Los Angeles are without employment is correct, 100,000 persons, including their dependents, are facing need.
