AND BOXING UPHELD**

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 13.—Boxing, as conducted in the "fight centers" of California, was given legal approval by the superior court of Los Angeles county today, when a jury found Jessie Willard, a heavyweight pugilist, not guilty of prize fighting, in a case that grew out of a fatal match between himself and Bull Young here last August.

The verdict was returned at 10:07 o'clock this morning after the jury had deliberated the evidence since late yesterday. Early ballots had shown two votes for conviction, but these jurors later were convinced by the majority.

In the trial the state sought to prove that Willard had violated the state law which prohibits prize fighting. By its decision the court defined the present status of the glove game in California, its decision coinciding with a decision given two years ago by Superior Judge Willis in a similar case in which Ad Wolgast and George Memie were defendants.

MIKE GIBBONS KNOCKS**BOB McALLISTER OUT**

New York, Jan. 13.—Mike Gibbons, of St. Paul, knocked out Bob McAllister of San Francisco, in the seventh round of their ten-round match here tonight.

The decisive blow—a right hook to the jaw—came at the end of one minute and 28 seconds' fighting in the round.

Gibbons weighed in at 152½ pounds and McAllister at 160. The Californian also had the advantage in height and reach.

McAllister outpointed his opponent in the first four rounds, although Gibbons occasionally sent over a hard left hook. Gibbons got to his man in the fifth, landing left hooks to the jaw and body, but McAllister's work at long range evened up the round.

Gibbons repeatedly hooked McAllister on the jaw with lefts in the sixth and McAllister showed signs of distress. In the final round Gibbons caught the Californian with a right cross to the jaw staggering him. He followed up his advantage with a bombardment of lefts and rights and ended the contest with a hard right hook to the point of the jaw.

THE STUDIOUS PRIMA DONNA

During the years that Yvonne de Treville spent in Europe, she was often obliged to study a new role in less than twenty-four hours notice, or learn to sing one of the parts in her repertoire in a different language. Frequently, Miss de Treville studied new roles on railroad trains.

"As I always travel with my little Irish harp," explained the singer, "it was possible for me to study a new part while traveling from one country to another. The traveling in Europe is for the most part, slower than in America; as my mother and I always have a compartment exclusively to ourselves, I have the needed privacy for work. But occasionally the railroad employees would appear as they heard the singing, which as a matter of course was mezza voce, but nevertheless ears heard the singing, when the train was nearing a standstill.

"While I studied all the roles in my repertoire in the languages of their composers, I also was compelled to learn the Italian operas in the French language and the French operas in the Italian language, and the German operas in both French and Italian. I also sing all my roles in English. I learned the Scandinavian languages in order to sing the Norwegian and Swedish songs in the original. I sing in eight languages and several additional dialects, but am by no means through with my studies of foreign tongues. Meanwhile, I do believe in English with all my heart, but it must be English pure of enunciation and elegant of diction."

**TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE
IS RESULT OF QUAKE**

One Hundred Dead In One Town in Japan and Town Is Almost Entirely Covered By Ashes.

**PEOPLE IN PANIC AND
ALL ARE FLEEING PLACE**

Entire District Almost in Darkness, Only Illumination Being From The Volcano.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.]

Tokio, Jan. 13.—The earthquake in the island of Kishiu has resulted in large loss of life and damage to property. At Moji, on the Kishiu railway, 100 persons have been killed. Many houses in the towns of Kagoshima, capital of the province of Satsuma, have been destroyed. Last night the entire district afforded a terrifying spectacle. The city was in darkness, the only illumination being the glare from the volcano Sagura-Jima, which was in violent eruption.

The evacuation of Kagoshima was impeded by a huge rock that had been thrown out by the volcano, which had wrecked the rails outside the town. All the coolies fled. A telegraph operator at Kagoshima sent this message:

"The city is almost buried in ashes and stones. The people are in a panic and a wild exodus has taken place. All the operators have fled. This will be the last dispatch."

**ARE POLICEMEN OF
SALEM OVERWORKED?**

Salem policemen are accused of working over eight hours by Labor Commissioner Hoff, and they must not exert themselves to such an extent if the city would evade a lawsuit, which has been threatened by the state official.

Mayor Steves has received a communication from the labor commissioner, in which it is claimed that there are complaints being received about the local policemen and members of the fire department being compelled to work over eight hours, in violation of the eight-hour law. Had the labor commissioner asked the mayor that policemen were compelled to remain on duty more than eight hours, it is believed that he might have cause for action. So far as the officers overworking themselves is concerned, even the chief admits his men are not sufficient.

If the city may contest the charges, the reason other cities are in the same fix.

**WHEATLY SPEEDER
SENTENCED TO JAIL**

San Francisco, Jan. 13.—The mil-lionaire Richard McCreery could not satisfy justice yesterday for violation

of the automobile speed law. Five days in the county jail, with no alternative fine, was the sentence imposed when McCreery pleaded guilty.

The wealthy speeder is a brother of Walter McCreery, the eccentric millionaire poloist, who is fighting for restoration to his legal competency in the courts here from a vantage point in England, which he took after a sensational flight from his guardian.

Asked his business today, Richard McCreery replied: "Why, judge, I have no business. I'm a capitalist."

The band of men obtained permission from Captain Gehlhar, of Company M, O. N. G., to remain over night in the local armory, with the understanding that they leave this morning. By sojourn in the grocery stores and other places of business a meager lunch was secured last night by the men.

One of the members intimated this morning that they would remain in the armory another night. However, Captain Gehlhar gave orders to close the doors this morning, or as soon as the crowd had left the building today, and keep them closed.

Claims Assault.

It was claimed by members of the crowd today that one of their members, a young lad, was assaulted in a local livery stable yesterday, while working for his dinner. They declared that the lad accepted a job cleaning up about the barn, when several men jumped onto him. There was considerable feeling manifested among the band this morn-

ing over the alleged occurrence, and several threats to find the persons who are said to have assaulted the boy were made.

Expressions of disgust at the manner in which Governor West has furnished work for the band were made in the armory today. The crowd, or, at least, most of the members, declared that the governor had no work for them, and that when they accepted his proposition to work on the state lands, they were told by state foremen that they were absolutely needless about the premises, and that the institutions were having a difficult time in keeping their steady men, let alone furnishing labor for outsiders.

Country Is Mecca.

"We can't get anything to eat in town, so we are going to remain in the country," explained a member of the crowd today. Just what they term as country was not explained by the man, as Albany is supposed to be the next city on the list.

Escorted to City Limits.

With Chief of Police Shodeck leading and about a dozen deputies intermixed in the line, the unemployed army was escorted out of the city this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. The crowd gave no trouble. A large band of men and boys followed.

The crowd was escorted to the city limits and directed toward Albany.

TIDAL WAVE HITS TOWN.
