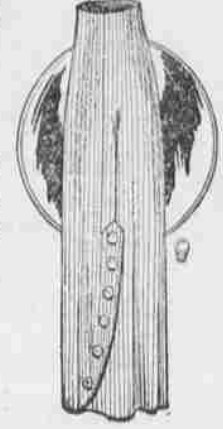

PROBE OF STRIKE AT CALUMET URGED

Senator Ashurst Wants Every Phase of Affair Covered in Resolution Now Introduced.

HISTORY OF AFFAIR NEEDS AIRING, INSISTS SENATOR

Would Find Out if Trust Exists, What Lawlessness Has Prevailed and if Wages Justified.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.]

Washington, Jan. 13.—Thorough investigation into every phase of the Calumet, Mich., mine strike, was suggested in a resolution introduced yesterday by Senator Ashurst. It provides for a rigid inquiry into the following points by the senate committee on education and labor:

History and present status of the relations between employers and employees.

Reasonableness of strikers demands for minimum wages, the eight hour day and the use of two men on the machine drills.

How much money has been invested by the companies, the gross yield and dividends since incorporation.

Whether employers or employees have declined to arbitrate through a commission to be named by the president of the United States and the governor of Michigan.

Whether access to the United States postoffices has been refused and by whom.

Whether the immigration laws have been violated.

Whether the services of the government officials would be of value.

Whether any persons have been convicted or punished in violation of the United States laws.

Whether the prices of copper have been maintained by the companies in restraint of trade.

Whether firearms or explosives have been brought into the state.

Efforts to unionize the mines and methods used to enforce demands of the miners.

Whether the administration of justice has been interfered with.

In connection with this resolution of Ashurst, he has a number of telegrams asking for a federal investigation.

UNCLE SAM WILLING TO PAY FOR DEAD HORSE

Washington, Jan. 13.—"Paying for a dead horse" is no more agreeable to the United States than to a private individual, even when the defunct animal is assessed at the modest price of \$50. Comptroller George E. Downey, of the treasury, has just issued a ruling that under certain circumstances Uncle Sam will pay for a horse that dies in the service of its country, hereafter, but that nothing will be paid for the horse that sacrificed its life on the altar of patriotism on April 12, 1912.

On April 12, 1912, a member of the forestry service in Colorado hired a horse which died late the same day. It was discovered that the secretary of agriculture, under whose jurisdiction the forestry bureau comes, had no authority to pay for the animal. Accordingly on March 4, last, congress passed a law permitting the secretary to reimburse owners of horses which in the future die in government harness.

Col. F. G. Caffey, solicitor for the department of agriculture, in a recent opinion, held that as the act was of a remedial nature, it should work retrospectively as well as prospectively. But Comptroller Downey held otherwise; so only the dead horses of the future will be paid for.

The watch was a gold one, and evidently a good timekeeper, for it was still running.

All is quiet at The Dalles, and Ralph Gibbons, over whom the row started is still holding down the job of policeman.

Willamette Lodge No. 2, Masons, celebrated its 64th anniversary at Portland Saturday night with a banquet at the Oregon hotel. There were 300 present.

Ray Castle, a young farmer who lived near Ironside, was found dead on his sled Sunday. He had been hauling feed to his stock, and had been dead several hours when found.

Pendleton is making a vigorous effort to get an \$80,000 postoffice.

Pendleton farmers are borrowing trouble, as they now fear the warm weather will be followed by a cold snap and that great damage will be done.

Eugene Fruit Growers association Saturday voted to increase its capital stock from \$25,000 to \$50,000. The extra money will be used in improving and enlarging the plant.

A Pendleton man says the building of the portage road at Celilo caused the railroads to reduce rates and that resulted in a saving to Umatilla county alone, of \$100,000 in one year.

A large consignment of eastern trout eggs has been received at Klamath Falls.

About the middle of the month the big dredge built for work at Coos Bay,

but which is now in the Columbia, will be sent to the scene of its labors.

Linn county has issued an order regulating the loads that may be hauled over the county roads. The loads are fixed by the width of the wagon tires and the largest load permitted is 3000 pounds.

A general order reducing wages from \$2.50 a day to \$2 has been issued by the Twelv Bros., contractors building the Willamette-Pacific railroad from Eugene to North Bend. Many have quit, but others in plenty applied for the places.

MANY NEEDY FED.

London, Jan. 13.—More than thirteen million meals were supplied to the needy in Great Britain by the Salvation Army in the past year, according to a special report issued today by General Bramwell Booth. Night lodgings to the number of 7,129,723 were furnished; 93,766 applications were filed with the army's various labor bureaus, and 59,392 situations were found. In connection with the prison-gate reform work 2,746 were received and 2,146 were passed out as satisfactory.

WOMAN OF 83 SHOVELS HER OWN SIDEWALKS

Denver, Jan. 13.—Odd job seekers, especially those who want to pick up a bit of change shoveling coal, get no chance at all with Mrs. Margaret James, 83 years young. Mrs. James, despite her advanced age, shovels her own coal and she also shovels her own sidewalks clean of snow when the storm king rages. She attributes her longevity to shoveling. She thinks shoveling anything is the best exercise in the world. Recently she transferred two tons of coal from her sidewalk into her cellar, and said she was sorry it wasn't three tons.

"Work" said Mrs. James to a United Press correspondent, "is the secret of happiness. Work is the secret of longevity. With good, hard work anyone can live to a reasonable age. I call 100 years 'reasonable'."

"Yes, I shoveled snow during the recent storm which broke over Denver in December, when four feet of it fell. I hadn't had any real work to do for several weeks previous to the storm and I was going stale. I was mighty thankful when the snow came for that reason. I believe shoveling the snow from my pavements prolonged my life several months. I felt like a two-year-old after the exercise in the open."

"If it wasn't for having the furnace to take care of in the winter, I don't know what I would do to keep in shape. Next to shoveling anything in the open, feeding a furnace, is my particular hobby. If the young people of today spent as much time and energy shoveling coal, snow or dirt or anything out in the open, as they do dancing the turkey trot or tango in a close, ill-ventilated dance hall they would be better for it. There would be less sickness and trouble. The girls would be better able to stand the rigors of child birth and the men would be better physically and mentally to perform their daily tasks."

MISSOURI ENJOINED.

Jefferson City, Mo., Jan. 13.—Attorney General Baker and members of the state public service commission were yesterday enjoined by Judge McPherson of the federal court at Kansas City from proceeding with suits in the state court to recover overcharges from the revenue claimed to be due citizens of the state, and estimated variously at from \$15,000,000 to \$24,000,000.

SENDS OUT MUCH MAIL MATTER DURING HIS TERM

Washington, Jan. 13.—No member of the tariff-befetted and currency-torn congress did more to earn his Christmas holiday than Representative Peter Goelet Gerry, millionaire member from the second Rhode Island district, who sent out 100,000 pieces of mail matter during his first ten months at the capitol. Obviously, the wealthy Rhode Island man did not write all the letters in long hand, nor did he lick all the flaps on the envelopes, but he did personally sign most of them, which was almost ten months work in itself, regardless of his other duties. Not content to use the comparatively less expensive letter head which the government now furnishes its representatives, Goelet uses a very classy, embossed stationery which he pays for himself. All that his voluminous correspondence costs Uncle Sam is the transportation thereof.

Mrs. Gerry, formerly Miss Mathilde Townsend and one of the most progressive and well liked of the capital's society women, spends agreeable deal of time at her husband's office, helping him materially.

PLAN TO ESTABLISH ANOTHER NATIONAL PARK

Brownsville, Texas, Jan. 13.—There is only one place in the United States, according to state authorities, where Easter lilies will grow profusely at Easter time. This is Las Palmas, a few miles below Brownsville, and the southernmost town in the entire country. The federal government is considering a plan to buy a tract of land at Las Palmas and establish there a national park—the only one of its kind.

Harvey G. Stiles, the Texas horticultural expert, visited Washington recently, interested Department of Agriculture experts in the proposed park and urged that an experimental farm be established in connection with the proposed park for the purpose of developing Easter lilies and tropical plants. Stiles is confident that the government will establish the park.

TO KILL OFF RATS.

Berlin, Jan. 13.—To combat the plague of rats with which the town of Leuenberg, Saxony, is suffering, the authorities have ordered that "all citizens shall spend the interval between three and four p. m. every Tuesday in strewing floors and walls of their dwellings, stables and outhouses with phosphorus and arsenic." Heavy penalties are provided for those who fail to obey the order.

TO DISCUSS TARIFF.
