ENGINEER DIES AT HIS POST AFTER RACE

Milwaukee Man Beats Rival Train on Road Which Parallels Line and Passes Away.

FIREMAN SEES HE IS DEAD AND TAKES CHARGE OF IT

Death Comes on His Birthday, and His Friends Had Planned a Pleasant Surprise for Him.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 13.—George S. Perry, engineer of the Milwaukee overland fast express, the Olympian, dropped dead, of heart disease at his throttle yesterday.

Death occurred soon after Perry had won a race over a rival train on a road that parallels the Milwaukee near Easton, just before the roads begin to climb the steep grade up the east slope of the Cascade mountains. After Perry's train had passed its rival and gone through Easton at full speed, W. W. Holton, the fireman on the engine, looked across the cab and saw that the engineer was dead. Holton took Perry's place and drove the train to Laconia, on the west slope of the range, where another engineer took charge, and ran the train to Seattle.

Perry was one of the oldest men in the employ of the Milwaukee, having been in the cab more than 40 years. During that time he had never figured in a wreck. He was 65 years old yesterday and his friends had planned a surprise party for his home coming. Many of them did not know of his death until they went to the railway station last night to accompany him home to the birthday festivities.

UNIDENTIFIED MAN IS VICTIM OF THUGS IN FRISCO

San Francisco, Jan. 13.—With his head crushed, apparently by some heavy instrument, probably a shovel, an unidentified man, about 4 years old, was found early today between the Western Pacific tracks here, and is dying at the Emergency hospital, a victim of thugs, the police believe. There was no clue to the assailants, or to their victim, in whose pockets only 10 cents were found.

MONEY SHARK TOLMAN MUST SERVE HIS TERM

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 13.—Governor Glynn finally yesterday refused to pardon D. H. Tolman the convicted New York money lender.

District Attorney Whitman refused to say that he favored an absolute pardon for Tolman. The governor requires the endorsement of the trial judge and the prosecutor in every case where he exercises clemency.

The governor said the amount of indebtedness which would be cancelled by the notes Tolman promised to destroy if released and the number of people who would be benefited would be based on guess work. Tolman's offer of a bond as a guarantee of his sincerity was worthless, added the governor.
