Judge Kelly will continue work in department No. 1 in the regular court chambers and it is not probable that he will finish up his labors for ten or eleven days owing to the many new matters coming up every day. Judge Kelly will hold court all day Saturday, despite the fact that Saturday is generally considered a holiday with the Marion county courts.

A gun is a very dangerous article even in the hands of man, and the police are going to try and locate the owners of the weapons which are being fired off during all times of the night.

Application was made to the state railroad commission by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company to discontinue its office at Granite, the company explaining that the town is now reached by a farmers' line from Sumpter. The same company also asked that it be allowed to discontinue its office at Mohawk, Lane county, Mohawk is now reached by a farmers' line from Springfield. 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ADAMS FOUND GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] St. Helens, Or., Jan. 30.—Following an abrupt closing this afternoon of the trial of Greene Adams on a charge of murder, the jury last night at 8:30 o'clock brought in a verdict of manslaughter.

The day was taken up with the testimony of Adams, who declared that he shot only in self-defense, and not until Robert McPherson had fired three shots, one of which, Adams testified, hit him in the leg.

Adams said that he was in the little drugstore at Vernonia last summer, when McPherson came out of the Webster hotel. Adams left the drugstore and started towards the postoffice and saw McPherson crossing the bridge towards him.

As the twin met, Adams declared, McPherson crowded him off the narrow walk; then struck at him. Adams dodged the blow, he said, when again McPherson struck at him, but missed. At this time, the witness testified, McPherson drew a revolver, at which the defendant drew his, also.

Says McPherson Fired First. Adams declared, however, that he did not fire until McPherson had shot three times at him. When McPherson was shot, he emptied the cylinders of his weapon at Adams, the latter said on the stand, but failed to hit him again.

While this gun play was in progress, Adams fired two shots, more, he said, the first of these being fatal, McPherson dying within a few minutes.

The testimony of the state's witness, the child, Hattie Webster, who said that Adams fired first, was substantiated by R. Sessman and C. W. Mellinger, who declared they heard the shots and that the first one made a loud report, while those following were in rapid succession, like the series of reports from a bunch of firecrackers.
