ONE MORE DIVIDEND FOR BANK CREDITORS

State Superintendent of Banks Says Creditors of American Bank & Trust Company Must Wait.

SEVERAL STOCKHOLDERS SUED AS DOUBLY LIABLE

Five Per Cent Dividend Declared and Total of \$8,500 is Being Distributed to Creditors.

S. G. Sargent, state superintendent of banks, announced late yesterday that a 5 per cent dividend had been declared in the settlement of the affairs of the American Bank & Trust company of Portland, which was taken in charge by the state department in December, 1911.

Mr. Sargent announced that the approved claims against the bank at the time its doors were closed amounted to \$175,000. He said there would probably be but one more dividend and that would not be larger than 5 per cent. Indications are that it will be a long time before it reaches the creditors, for the remaining assets are of a doubtful nature.

The superintendent has sued several stockholders of the institution to collect under the double liability law.

LOOTING OF NEW HAVEN IS DISCUSSED IN SENATE

Washington, Feb. 7.—The senate debated yesterday the alleged "looting" of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad.

A resolution demanding the names of those profiting "by the wrecking of the corporation" was pressed by Senator Norris of Nebraska. He discussed Interstate Commerce Commissioner Prouty's statement that "\$12,000,000 had disappeared into thin air." Norris also read quotations from various newspapers which asserted that "J. P. Morgan & Co. got the money."

"If the five or six men who looted the road were wearing stripes behind prison bars," said Senator Borah of Idaho, "it would have a tremendous moral effect on the country."

DRUGGIST DISMISSED

Los Angeles, Feb. 7.—Judge Chambers dismissed today the charge of murder against John H. Grondin, a druggist, who was accused of poisoning his wife. Chambers said that the evidence against Grondin, which was wholly circumstantial, was insufficient to hold him for trial. Deputy District Attorney Shannon declared that he will continue to investigate Mrs. Grondin's death.

MOURN YIDDISH COMEDIAN.

More than 25,000 persons followed the coffin from the Hebrew actors' club to the National theater. Mogulesko's last request was that his associates should sing some of his favorite comic songs at his funeral. Several attempted to comply but broke down before the songs were finished.
