

ONE MORE DIVIDEND FOR BANK CREDITORS

State Superintendent of Banks Says Creditors of American Bank & Trust Company Must Wait.

SEVERAL STOCKHOLDERS SUED AS DOUBLY LIABLE

Five Per Cent Dividend Declared and Total of \$8,500 is Being Dis-

tributed to Creditors.

S. G. Sargent, state superintendent of panks, announced late yesterday that a per cent dividend had been declared in the settlement of the affairs of the American Bank & Trust company of Portland, which was taken in charge by the state department in December, 1911. The money will be sent to the depositors of the institution as fast as the checks can be made out. Soon after the doors of the bank were closed a dividend of 45 per cent to depositors was announced. There are 850 depositor creditors, and the total amount to e distributed now is \$8500.
