MILITANTS IN ROW OVER REBELS' TACTICS

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] London, Feb. 7.—Miss Sylvia Pankhurst, daughter of the militant suffragette leader, announced late yesterday her secession from the Women's Social and Political Union, the militant women's organization. The East End of London Federation, which hitherto has been a branch of the parent organization, will henceforth be entirely independent.

The rift among the militant suffragettes is said to be due to Miss Sylvia Pankhurst's ultra-revolutionary aspirations, which the leaders of the Women's Social and Political Union are beginning to believe are damaging their cause.

Reports of dissension in the inner circles of the militant organization involving the Pankhurst triumvirate have been in circulation for some time. According to these, Christabel Pankhurst desires to end her long exile in Paris and return to London and take control of the organization, for it is doubtful if her mother, Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, who is in Switzerland, will be well enough for some months to resume her duties of commander-in-chief.

But Christabel, the reports say, desires to come back under conditions that will not necessitate frequent terms of imprisonment for under the "cat and mouse" act. Therefore, it is said, she wants military dropped. In this stand she has the support of many of the older members of the organization, who believe that continuance of militant tactics will be injurious to the cause.

Sylvia Pankhurst, on the other hand, is not prepared to abandon militancy until she has fully tested the fighting capacity of her "people's army," with which she is credited as believing she can start a revolution that will force the government to enfranchise women.

Several of the younger and more ambitious members of the Women's Social and Political Union view with unconcealed satisfaction the Pankhurst feud, believing that it will end the autocratic sway the Pankhursts have exercised over the society since Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Pethick Lawrence were driven out of it last year.

FRY DOES NOT APPROVE OF BROWN'S ENDORSEMENT

Some local Democrats were not enthusiastic today over Governor West's endorsement of Brown, the Roseburg Republican, for attorney general.
"I am not surprised at anything Governor West does politically," said Daniel J. Fry, chairman of the Democratic committee.
"I think the committee will take up the matter, but I have no idea what will be done. In view of the fact that Governor West is supposed to be behind the candidacy of Dr. C. J. Smith for the Democratic nomination for Governor, his announcement, in my opinion, is indiscreet, to say the least."
"There is no question that the Democrats will nominate as good a man for the office as Mr. Brown. Our candidate will be entitled to the vote of every Democrat and especially that of Governor West."

NACY FILES FOR OFFICE OF COUNTY RECORDER HERE

Bert W. Macy has filed his declaration of intention to seek the Republican nomination for the office of County Recorder. Mr. Macy is a native Oregonian, having been born in this county and was educated in the public schools of this city and at the Willamette University. He is a graduate of the Willamette College of Law, class of 1912, and has been admitted to the bar.
He was elected a member of the city council in 1912, and has taken a prominent part in its affairs.
His friends claim that he is eminently qualified by training and experience for the position he seeks and are boosting his candidacy with enthusiasm. They predict he will poll a record vote in Salem and throughout the county and insist his nomination is already assured.

ORDINANCE NO. 1317.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon:

Section 1. (Supplying tobacco to minors). It shall be unlawful within the city of Salem, to sell, give, or in any manner furnish to any minor under the age of eighteen years, tobacco in any form, or any substance of which tobacco is a component part.

Any person violating the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than five dollars, nor more than fifty dollars; or by imprisonment of not less than five or more than twenty days in the city jail; or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 2. (Use or possession of tobacco by minors). It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of eighteen years to smoke, chew or use tobacco in any manner or form, or any substance of which tobacco is a component part, in or upon any public highway, street, park, place or resort within the city of Salem; or to have on or about his person any such tobacco or substance.

Any minor violating any of the provisions of this section shall, upon his first conviction thereof, be publicly admonished and reprimanded by the recorder; and for each subsequent conviction, shall be fined in any sum not less than two dollars nor more than twenty dollars, or by imprisonment of not less than one or more than ten days in the city jail.
