## WILL DEMAND RECALL OF BOLIVIAN CONSUL FOR OFFENSE

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] San Francisco, Feb. 19.—That he will demand the recall of Carlos Sanjines, the Bolivian consul here, who escaped prosecution on a charge of committing an offense against two 15-year-old girls, following the successful plea that the police courts had no jurisdiction over the representative of a foreign government, was the declaration today of United States District Attorney Preston.

Preston announced his determination to forward a transcript of the children's testimony to Attorney-General McReynolds, with the recommendation that Secretary of State Bryan be requested to ask for Sanjines' removal.

"Should Sanjines' recall not be effected," said Preston, "I shall take steps to prosecute him in the federal courts."

"The charges made against me by the two young girls are unfounded and unjust," said Sanjines today. "While it is true that I did attend the theatre, I never saw those girls until they faced me with the charge of misconduct."

"I cannot say what I shall do regarding the effort being made to recall me, if such an effort is being made."

## HORSE HITS AUTOMOBILE

CRASHES INTO BUREN'S MACHINE WHILE ESCAPING ENGINE AND DAMAGE RESULTS.

A horse said to belong to a family residing south of the city named Alexander, became frightened at the S. P. switch engine at the intersection of Commercial and Trade streets this morning, and, while in the act of running away, collided with the rear end of the big automobile owned by Max O. ## FIGHT OF TELEGRAPHERS AND O. W. HALTED FOR WHILE

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Portland, Or., Feb. 19.—Pending the arrival of G. W. W. Hangar, government mediator, the O. W. R. & N. company telegraphers were lying on their arms today in their fight for seniority rights, shorter hours and increases in pay. President J. D. Farrell, of the O. W. R. & N. company, the railroad from which the operators are seeking concessions, had no new statements to make following the one of yesterday, which outlined the policy of the company as against the main terms asked by the operators.

E. L. F. Manion, fifth vice-president of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, stated today that the strike vote would not be canvassed until after the arrival of Hangar. Neither would any further overtures be attempted by the grievance committee. He declared the men would treat no further direct with Vice-President O'Brien, at least until the federal official should come with his advice.

WILL FORCE HIM TO SUPPORT CHILD BORN OUT OF WEDLOCK

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] San Francisco, Feb. 19.—The first suit under the new law making the father responsible for the support of a child born out of wedlock was begun in the superior court here today.

It was begun at the state immigration commission's instance. The plaintiff was Louis Gambetta, Jr., aged nine months. He sued through Mrs. Clara Clivio, an associated charity worker acting as his guardian. The defendant was Louis Gambetta. He was asked to pay \$25 monthly for the child's support.

Agathe Levantino, an immigrant girl, was said to be the mother. She was destitute, the case was brought to the immigration commission's attention and suit followed.

WILL CROSS ATLANTIC.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Chicago, Feb. 19.—Harold McCormick and three passengers and two pilots, including Lincoln Beachey, will attempt to cross the Atlantic ocean in a hydroplane soon, according to announcement here by the Chicago Post. McCormick figures that the trip from Newfoundland to Ireland can be made in 30 hours.

BIGGER PRICES DEMANDED.
