CRUSHED TO DEATH UNDER AN AUTOMOBILE STAGE

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.] San Diego, Cal., Feb. 21.—Crushed beneath an automobile stage when the car was crowded from the road on the Beacon Hill grade, six miles west of here, Zell M. Beebe, a retired farmer from Seattle, was killed last night.

Of the five other passengers in the stage at the time of the accident, two suffered broken arms and the rest escaped unhurt. The road was slippery with the rains and the automobile slipped at the edge of the embankment, plunging twelve feet into a running stream of water, where it turned turtle, pinning three of the occupants beneath it.
