TRIES TO PACIFY SPAIN BY SAYING PHELAN IS CIVILIAN.

Washington, March 5.—Through Ambassador Willard, at Madrid, Secretary of State Bryan has explained to the Spanish government today that James D. Phelan of San Francisco is only a private citizen; that his views are in no way official and consequently that Spain must bear Americans, as a people, no ill will, even though Phelan did say it was a decadent nation with but a short life to live.

Phelan was quoted to this effect in a recent speech in San Francisco. The Spanish government heard of it, and began an immediate investigation. Who was Phelan, it inquired of Ambassador Willard; why did he say what he did? When was he in Spain and what capacity? Was he an official? Did his opinions reflect those of the United States?

With every assurance of its distinguished consideration Secretary Bryan begged the Spanish government to believe that the administration does not consider Spain decadent and wishes it a long life and a happy one.

TRY TO SAVE POOR WOMAN FROM JAIL FOR 30 DAYS.

Belvidere, N. J., March 5.—The alternative of paying a fine of \$300 within 30 days or going to prison for from one to seven years as a result of stealing a small quantity of brass from the Lehigh Valley railroad was faced here yesterday by Mrs. Ellen Laughlin of Phillipsburg, mother of nine children. Women's organizations have taken up Mrs. Laughlin's fight and are making a comparison between her sentence, and that Charles H. Space, also of Phillipsburg, who was fined \$50 following his conviction on the charge of mistreating a young girl.

DEPOSITORS IN NEAR RIOT.

New York, March 5.—One hundred depositors in the defunct Henry Sigel private bank engaged in a near riot in the United States district court here yesterday afternoon when the hearing of charges against Sigel and his partner, Frank Vogel, was postponed to permit the district attorney to investigate further. Angered at the postponement, a woman depositor grabbed the gavel and demanded the immediate arrest of Sigel. The crowd applauded and bailiffs cleared the courtroom.

COWLES PROMOTED.

Chicago, March 5.—After subsisting on raw potatoes for two days, Frank Sessler, his wife and their five-year-old son are being cared for here by charitable organizations. The family was found suffering from hunger and exposure in the bars of a commission merchant. Sessler had been out of work for several months. The family will be cared for until employment can be found for the husband.

WEALTHY NEW YORKER IS ARRAIGNED AS WHITE SLAVER.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 5.—Charged with violating the Mann act, Edmond H. Damon, a wealthy New Yorker, was arraigned here yesterday before United States Commissioner Williams and held under \$2,000 bail for hearing Saturday. It is alleged that Damon started a transcontinental joy ride at Jacksonville, Florida, bringing to California Miss Anna Thorp and Miss Lillian Lynch; the women, with two valets, are held at San Francisco. Damon was arrested at San Luis Obispo.
