Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, will at or about 7:30 o'clock p. m., on the 16th day of March, 1914, or at the same hour at any subsequent regular Council meeting thereafter, at the Common Council chambers in the City of Salem, Oregon, proceed to amend and modify section 4 of Ordinance No. 1313 so as to re-adjust and correct the proportionate shares of the total cost of improving South Twelfth street from Mission street to the South City limits heretofore assessed upon each lot or part thereof or parcel of land liable therefor.
