UNION CARPENTERS QUIT STATEHOUSE JOB

Strike Because They Allege Southwick and Headrick are Employing Non-Union Workers.

CONTRACTORS STATE STRIKE WILL NOT DELAY WORK

Assert There Are Plenty of Idle Men On Hand to Take Places of Those Who Are Off Job.

Four members of the carpenter's union, employed by Southwick & Headrick, contractors engaged in remodeling the state house, struck and quit work today because the firm was employing several non-union carpenters.

According to the contractors the union members yesterday voiced protests against the employment of non-union men, and when they reported for work today, and found them still on the job, the strike would not delay the work as they struck. The contractors stated there are plenty idle men seeking employment, and that their services can be obtained. The contractors state that they have been paying the union scale, and also observing union hours, and that he only grievance the strikers had was the employment of non-union men.
