### WHITE SLAVERY SHOWN

REMARKABLE PICTURES, ATTRACTING GREAT NOTORIETY IN PORTLAND TO BE SEEN AT BLIGH.

T. G. Bligh, the well-known theatre man, has succeeded in making final arrangements to have the Samuel H. London motion picture film depicting the white slave traffic flashed on the screen of the Bligh theatre next Monday and Tuesday. These pictures gained much favorable notoriety in Portland, and the metropolitan press of that city has this to say in regard to the film: "Anyone who has ever had an interest in the naming of a book, play or a moving picture, will have a story to tell of the difficulties which beset them in the selection of what would seem an appropriate and attractive title. Many a play has been named and renamed, and then named again, before the promoters would tell the public its true name. Some titles are certainly very misleading, and in an effort to secure the best the sponsors have often gone amiss. "When Samuel H. London first filmed his white slave story he did not give it any title at all, for he intended that the picture was to be shown only at private exhibitions, and therefore did not consider it necessary to give it a name. The pictures were being shown one evening at the hall of the Sociological Research Film corporation, and everyone in the audience besought Mr. London to show the pictures in public. "But," said Mr. London, "I haven't even as much as given them a name." "Hub," said an attentive listener, "anything will do, for you must realize that they give the true inside of the white slave traffic, and that is sufficient for those who will throng to see them." And it was from this speech of the very interested spectator that night that Mr. London secured his title, "The Inside of the White Slave Traffic."

No one under 16 years of age will be admitted to the exhibition next Monday and Tuesday.

### BISHOP IS CANDIDATE FOR SENATOR HERE

Well Known Clothing Merchant, Thrice Mayor of Salem, Admits He Is in Race for Nomination

WILL OPPOSE CREATION OF USELESS COMMISSIONS, HE SAYS

Will Do What He Can to Promote Efficiency in Departments of State, If Elected to Office.

At the solicitations of a wide circle of friends, both in business life and otherwise in Salem, Hon. C. P. Bishop, the well known clothing merchant here, has unofficially announced his intention to become a candidate for state senator to represent Marion county.

This announcement comes as a most agreeable surprise to the many friends of Mr. Bishop. The popular Salem merchant was elected mayor of this city three different times, is a member of board of trustees of Willamette university and is a progressive and live wire business man from every stand point.

"I will, if elected to the office of senator for Marion county and the state of Oregon in general, urgently demand an economical and a practical administration of public affairs from both officials and common employes of the state and counties."

This is the stand that Mr. Bishop will take if elected and he stated this morning that he will vigorously oppose the creation of all useless and expensive commissions a useless drain upon the work for the establishment of greater efficiency in departments of state absolutely necessary to the conduct of public business. Mr. Bishop is not antagonistic toward commissions which have been created but states that, after a thorough investigation, he finds such commissions a useless drain upon the public finance, he will work to abolish them irrespective of class or order.

He declares that he is aspiring for the office not as a politician, but as a man who desires to leave public life with a record upon which his children and ancestors may look with a feeling that he has done something for a whole state and that he does not intend to make a campaign in which dirty politics will prevail but will seek the vote of the people of Marion county right and hopes to be elected in such a manner that he will be able to work harmoniously with the other fellow who is to be elected senator.

### LAWSON WILL NOT GO

WEST ANNOUNCES COLONEL WILL INSTEAD FORWARD AN AFFIDAVIT TO BAKER

Announcement was made today by Governor West, after reading a telegram received this morning from the foreman of the Baker county grand jury stating that Col. Lawson is desired as a witness, and also that the jury will listen to any evidence that Frank Snodgrass has to present, that he will have the Colonel forward an affidavit covering any evidence he can submit, and that he will have Snodgrass appear before the jury, if it will subpoena him.

The message from the foreman stated that Lawson is wanted to testify as to law violations in Copperfield, and also as to charges that District Attorney Godwin and Sheriff Rand had failed to enforce the laws. Further it stated that no subpoenas would be issued for witnesses residing outside of Baker county.

"Colonel Lawson cannot give any material evidence as to law violations in Copperfield and Baker county," said the executive in discussing the message. "Snodgrass, as special agent, made a thorough investigation of the county, and he is the man who can testify as to law violations. Neither can Lawson testify as to any charge made against District Attorney Godwin or Sheriff Rand, but Snodgrass can. I will, however, forward an affidavit from Lawson covering what matters he can testify to, and I will send Snodgrass to appear before the grand jury, if it will subpoena him. Otherwise I will not, for we have no money to defray his expenses."

"I would be perfectly willing to appear before the grand jury and testify as to all I know, if I had assurances that papers would not be served on me in the civil suit brought against me," stated Col. Lawson. "I have no money, however, to fight a lawsuit with in Baker county, and without such assurances I will not appear before the grand jury. I will make an affidavit to all I know, and forward it."

According to Lawson he has not been summoned, and were he to be served with a subpoena it would not be effective, for he has not yet been relieved from the military duty he was assigned to when he put Copperfield under martial law, and until relieved he is exempt from being summoned to appear before a grand jury.

### ADVISES ORGANIZATION

Washington, March 21.—That he was advising government employes to organize for higher wages and affiliate with the American Federation of Labor was admitted today by Representative Nolan of California. Nolan said he had received hundreds of letters from government employes, many of them unsigned, supporting his bill for a minimum wage of \$3 per day for government workers.

**MUNICIPAL UNDERTAKER TO FIGHT "HIGH DYING" COSTS.**  
Cleveland, March 21.—The high cost of dying is threatened with extermination if Cleveland's latest municipal move becomes a reality. It is a municipal undertaker. Law Director Stockwell is advocating the project. It is not the rich he hopes to aid. He desires to protect the poor from excessive funeral charges and believes a city undertaker is the only solution of the problem.

"In many cases funeral expenses are twice the amount they should be," says Stockwell. The persons who need the services of an undertaker, particularly the poor, are at the mercy of the undertaker. The city should furnish protection to the public by standing ready to conduct funerals at figures approximately the actual cost."

If casket makers and dealers in undertaker's supplies ally themselves the undertakers to balk the plan, Stockwell would have the city make its own supplies at the Warronsville city farm.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 21.—General Morris Rose and 27 of his unemployed "army" received the surprise of their lives today when they were released from jail on their own recognizance, informed that they might establish a temporary camp in the bed of the Los Angeles river, bowed into police automobiles and whizzed back to the camp that the police broke up two days ago.

The action of the police indicated that they have attempted a new solution of the unemployed army problem. According to Rose, he was given tacitly to understand that he might do all the organizing he pleases in the river bed, without police molestation; in fact, that the police would aid his mobilization plans. After all of which, Rose is to march his army out of town. He intends to lead them to Sacramento to join Kelly's hand at "Liberty City."

Rose has called mass meetings of the unemployed for tonight and tomorrow, at which he will ask for recruits. He is confident that he will gather more than 2000 men for the march.

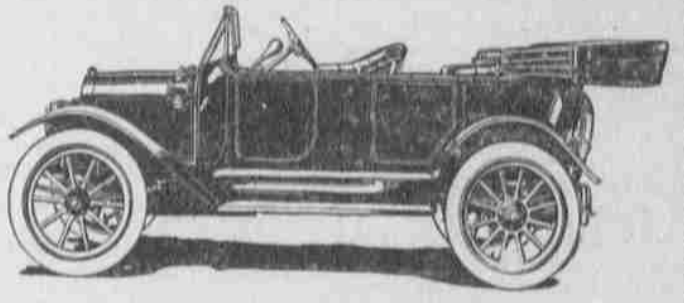
