As an illustration, Mr. Galloway took three tax payers, each having \$100 to pay for taxes. He said that the man with the ready money could get off with 49¢ taxes under the old law; the medium tax payer could about break even while the poor fellow who had to borrow money to meet his taxes was compelled to dig up at least \$115. Under the new system, said the speaker, the man with the short funds cannot possibly pay over \$1.05 and he has just the same opportunities as the man with the big sack.

Mr. Galloway stated that the necessities should begin in January and be pushed right through until fall.

Mr. Galloway said that Marion, Multnomah and all the counties containing the larger cities, were given the frayed end of the deal when apportionments were under the old system. He said that it was natural that the larger cities were more expensive but that they were given apportionments under the old law far lower than fair and proper.

Mr. Galloway's talk was exceedingly instructive and reached every point of interest to the general taxpayer hearing him. He answered numerous questions and told the members of the republican club some things regarding taxation that they never dreamed of. His address was received with the closest of attention.

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CANDIDATES ARE GIVEN BIG JOLT BY GALLOWAY

Commissioner Says Trouble is They Are Always Passing Proposition Up to Other Fellow.

CERTAIN SEEKER FOR OFFICE BERATING PRESENT SYSTEM

Doing it Simply Because it is Easiest Thing to Reach When Bolstering Up Taxation Argument.

"The trouble with you candidates is that you are always passing up the tax proposition to the other fellow," said Charles V. Galloway, state tax commissioner, at the meeting held by the republican club last night in the auditorium of the promotion department of the commercial club. "The legislature creates the taxes and then leaves them for the other fellow to consider. This has been the condition of affairs for years. I venture to say that the taxes will be \$3,000,000 more after the next legislative meets and the increase will go on in spite of all that candidates say."

Mr. Galloway said that certain candidates are jumping onto the new tax system and roasting it to beat the band for the simple reason that the system is the easiest and most convenient to reach when making assertions in regard to the high taxes in the state.
