## Capital City Brevities

An organization was formed in Portland last Wednesday composed of former Willamette university law students, and its purpose is to boost Judge Charles L. McNary for re-election to the supreme bench. The new club is to be called the "Portland-Willamette McNary for Re-Election." The Portland lawyers are solid for Judge McNary, having broken into the legal world while the supreme justice was then dean of the Willamette law school here. They intend to canvass the whole county of Multnomah for the popular jurist, and will also call upon their old brother students who are now practicing law in various parts of the state. Judge McNary is well known throughout the state, and there is probably not a county in Oregon in which there is not a lawyer who graduated from the local law department.

Attorney-General Crawford has today filed an appeal in the case of the state against the state board of control involving about \$16,000 said to have been spent improperly. The money was a part of the penitentiary foundry fund or revolving fund, and was spent by Governor West to make improvements at the penitentiary. The attorney-general, in the suit, alleged that the board had no right to spend the money, notwithstanding the fact that the state got full value. Circuit Judge Kelly sustained a demurrer to the complaint and dismissed the suit.

Uncle Sam has notified the Salem Commercial club that he wants to know something about the climate and fruit products in and around Salem. He writes Secretary Bynon that he would like to get in touch with several horticulturists in this vicinity and be advised when the fruit trees begin blooming and what the conditions are in regard to killing frosts at this time of the season. Our big uncle will be presented with all the information as soon as possible.

The case in which several state officials, including Governor West, were sued by the state through Attorney-General Crawford to recover money alleged to have been illegally expended out of the prison revolving fund, will be carried to the supreme court. Judge Kelly dismissed the complaint in the circuit court, and the attorney-general has now served notice of appeal to the higher tribunal.

## STEEVES ISSUES EDICT

### CALLS ON ALL RESIDENTS OF SALEM TO ASSIST IN CLEANING UP CITY.

Mayor Steeves today issued the following proclamation in regard to the fly crusade:

"Whereas, scientific research has shown the common house fly to be a dangerous agency for spreading diseases and a serious menace to humanity, and

"Whereas, the experience of other cities has demonstrated that it is feasible and practical entirely to eliminate this dangerous pest, and

"Whereas, a recent investigation shows that there are within the city no less than 1359 places in such unsanitary condition as to be adapted for breeding these insects, and

"Whereas, a movement is now under way by the Salem Commercial club and the city health department for eliminating flies through the improvement of general conditions.

"Therefore, I, B. L. Steeves, mayor of the city of Salem, do hereby call upon all residents of Salem to assist in this work, and do further warn each and every citizen that anyone maintaining upon his premises on or after the second day of April, 1914, a nuisance in the shape of open garbage receptacles, rubbish piles, or other forms of uncovered filth, will be dealt with to the limit of the law."
