CONSIDERABLE INTEREST IN CITY LOTS LATELY

Real Estate Transactions Expected to Be More Frequent as Spring Advances in Salem.

MUCH IMPROVEMENT WORK IS BEING DONE HERE

Painters Find This Busy Month and Lawns, Hedges, Shade Trees and Sidewalks Get Attention.

On account of the prevailing cool and inclement weather of the past few days, real estate transactions have become rather quiet, according to the dealers. They expect the business to open up stronger than ever however, just as soon as fair weather sets in again.

There seems to be considerable demand for Salem city property just now. Especially city lots are demanding more than usual attention and home-seekers are arriving here from many outside points. Property owners, or at least those who have vacant city lots for sale now, declare that several strangers have visited their places and looked over the property so far this week, who state they are looking for a home site.

Local painters contend that the present month has been about their busiest so far during the season. Evidence of this fact can be readily had by anyone taking a trip through the suburbs and noticing the many houses which are receiving new coats of paint.

Lawns, hedges, shade trees and sidewalks are also undergoing improvements and the back yards are receiving due attention since the swat-the-fly movement has been inaugurated.

There have been many old wooden sidewalks torn up this week and replaced with fine new concrete ones. This is a noted improvement and adds greatly to the general appearance of the city dwellings and surroundings.

City Buildings Completed. There remain but a few finishing touches to complete the many improvements which have been under way, several of the business buildings of Salem.

The fine newly remodeled Adolph Waters building on the corner of State and Commercial streets is nearly completed now and will soon be ready for occupancy. The exterior work has been finished and the only thing which now remains to be done is the altering of the interior. This latter work will require very little time.

The Gray-Belle Confectionery company has completed its fine new front in its new home in the Cross building.

on State Street. The front is modern and lends beauty to that part of the city. It consists of highly colored glass panels in the upper section of the front while the lower section is faced with big plate glass windows.

The interior of the Gray-Belle building is being rapidly completed and the confectionery company hopes to be permanently installed in the State street store before many more days elapse.

Journal's Home About Ready. The interior of the Capital Journal building has been completed, all but the painting and the installation of the big plate glass show square in the front of the place.

A \$750 home is to be built shortly by L. Ross at 349 South Seventeenth street. It will be a one-story dwelling. A building permit was issued to Dr. E. E. Fisher this week, who intends to erect a one-story frame dwelling at 1220 North Fourth street. The building is to cost in the neighborhood of \$400.

A. T. Broecker is planning on a one-story frame dwelling. It will cost about \$1,600.

While building permits have not been issued in large numbers so far this week, much building and work on old dwellings is being done nevertheless.

Supreme Justice George G. Barnett is having a fine combination concrete and wooden garage erected in the rear of his residence at the corner of High and Center streets. This auto home will be modern throughout, have a cement floor and everything else necessary to the up-to-date garage.

The brick work on the new garage being erected by Vick Brothers in the rear of their building facing on High street is going along at a great rate. Vick Brothers hope to have their building ready for use within the next few weeks.

The remodeling of the courthouse is about done. The respective court chambers have been plastered and are now ready for the tinting. The county assessor's quarters have been remodeled and the county clerk will soon have much more room owing to the old stairway leading up to the top floor from on the north side of the building having been removed and the space taken up for office purposes.

The court house will have four good stories to it when the work is completed owing to the old circuit court chambers being made into two floors instead of one.

IT APPEARS IN ANSWER

EXACT WORDS USED BY ENTRIKEN IN ACCUSING HIS WIFE OF INFIDELITY.

A communication has been received by The Capital Journal from Sadie V. Entriken in which it is charged that the paper, in its issue of March 18, published an item concerning the divorce suit of Sadie V. Entriken against Emmet W. Entriken which was not correct in that reporting the allegations contained in an answer filed to the complaint, it was stated that the plaintiff told the defendant at one time she had been unlawfully intimate with one Jack Ryan. Mrs. Entriken writes that this statement is untrue and was probably given to a Journal reporter by the defendant in order to injure her.

Reviewing the answer in question, the following is an exact copy of the allegations which Mrs. Entriken states are untrue and which compose a portion of Paragraph 5 of the answer:

"Said plaintiff acknowledged to defendant in the month of July, 1913, that she had recently been carnally familiar with Jack Ryan, and the defendant has condoned said offense to the extent that he would not be entitled to a divorce upon the ground of adultery, yet defendant's knowledge of this illegal intimacy has caused him great mental anxiety."

Mrs. Entriken requests The Capital Journal to explain, and the above section of the answer in question is self explanatory.
