## PENNY ENTERS PLEA OF GUILTY IN COURT

Forger Will Be Sentenced April 11 for Crime Committed Several Weeks Ago in Salem

OSCAR KELSAYS PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO CHARGE

Wheeler County Man Denies He Gave Liquor to Minor and Trial Set for Tuesday, April 7.

## TOO MANY PETTY CASES REACH STATE COURTS

Heltzel Also Lambasts Useless Commissions and Says Big Salmon Interests Backed One Big One.

INSISTS PEOPLE OVERBURDENED WITH TAXES AND LICENSES

La Follette Thinks It Is High Time Republicans Wake Up or Democrats Will Control Everything.

Live wires of the Republican party in this city met in the promotion department of the Salem Commercial club last night, and the government, both state and national, was discussed at length by candidates for state and county offices.

The first speaker on the program was Attorney James Heltzel, a candidate for the Republican nomination for the state senate from Marion county. Attorney Heltzel lambasted useless commissions and laid especial stress upon the present method of prosecuting petty cases in the state courts. Attorney Heltzel gave an explanation why our criminal laws should be changed and why the equity courts should not be overburdened with matters which could be satisfactorily settled without putting the taxpayers to the expense of paying the many fees resulting from such litigation.

The speaker pointed out that a large percentage of the petty cases coming before the local courts result in comparatively enormous expense with nothing to show for them other than an occasional light sentence for the "offender." Mr. Heltzel also stated that the courts should not be burdened with that class of civil suits which are brought simply to go down as record and to either enhance or advertise the value of certain properties belonging to the litigants.

Game Commission Roasted.

Attorney Heltzel buried a harpoon into the law which created the fish and game commission, and he received a liberal applause following his arraignment of the institution. He said that the big corporations backing the salmon industry and the big dealers in fish pushed the expense of conducting the fish commission upon the taxpayers for personal gain. He stated that the fish and game commission is a useless and expensive institution, which should be either altered to a great extent or abolished altogether. He declared that the ordinary sportsman—even the innocent youngster who don't know anything about law, and who would not know if he was violating it, was subject to vigorous prosecution if he failed to obey a hundred and one provisions in the fish and game laws. License for this, and license for that is being worked overtime, stated Attorney Heltzel, and with every license goes an expense which the taxpayer must dig up for. The expense, he said, is for an extra clerk, a deputy clerk, a deputy game warden, and, when the whole expense is figured up, it consists of some mighty high salaries for a small army of people, who either want to prosecute and punish the people who feed them, or a bunch who think the state owes them a living.

La Follette Ashamed.

A. M. La Follette took the floor following Mr. Heltzel's talk, and made a few remarks which were direct to the point. He said that he was ashamed of the fact that the Democratic party has been allowed to rule in both state and national politics for so many recent years. Mr. La Follette said that it was high time that the Republicans should wake up and get busy or the Democrats would have everything in both county and state.

Mr. La Follette is a candidate for the nomination of state senator from Marion county on the Republican ticket.

Being Lawed to Death.

The people of Oregon are being lawed to death stated B. J. Miles, candidate for the senate on the Republican ticket, when he was called upon to speak. Mr. Miles said that there were too many laws, and less enforcement, and he will elect, be in favor of bringing the statutes down to a normal stage, at least. Among the other candidates who talked last night were Sam Hughes, candidate for the senate; Geo. W. Weeks, senatorial candidate; Sam Brown, an aspirant for representative; Dana H. Allen, another candidate for the senate; Thomas Brown, a representative candidate; and Thomas B. Kay, candidate to succeed himself as state treasurer.
